Although Dragon Rising is nothing new to fans of high, epic fantasy, the book delivers. If author Tom Fallwell meant to tell a story in the purest spirit of Tolkien and other masters of fantasy, he certainly accomplished what he set out to do.

The book is filled with great heroes and an imposing villain, wonderful, magical creatures and mystical places. The main plot is solid, uncomplicated and to the point. The action is superb and the characters are well developed.

The story is focused on Delina, a young huntress who happens to be the last Dragonblood in Almar, a land that has been subdued by the evil Dark Lord Kargoth. Joining Delina on her quest to overthrow the sinister Kargoth we meet Morlock, a huge feline that is Delina's hunting partner, and Merric, a brave human hero who forges a deep and meaningful relationship with our young heroine.

If you're a longtime fan of fantasy, like yours truly, you'll know where this story is headed right from the start. But the journey to the finish line is extremely entertaining, action-packed, imaginative and well developed.

Furthermore, author Tom Fallwell has created interesting characters and a world that offers plenty of potential for a sequel or two. In my humble opinion, this is what a good book should do: leave the reader wanting more.

A prime example is the way Fallwell developed his dragons in this story; not an easy feat any way you wish to look at it. Aside from George R.R. Martin, for instance, I have rarely read a story where dragons actually feel like they could be real, living, breathing creatures. I certainly would love to read more about dragons in the world of Almar, be it in a prequel or a sequel.

Conclusion:

Dragon Rising is a great read for lovers of high, epic fantasy. In fact, you couldn't go wrong recommending this book as an introduction to the genre for new readers.

The novel is tightly plotted and in a very focused and determined way advances without departure or delay along the central storyline. This gives the tale a great sense of forward momentum and energy. The genre is solidly classic, epic fantasy, no blurring of the lines or mixed genres here. It is also very much a YA novel, so it will benefit greatly from being targeted to a very clearly defined readership from the get go. The unfolding friendship between our two leads, Merric and Delina, what's more, is one that should well titillate the teen audience. The magical powers on display among the various characters, so much a part of the enjoyment of reading in this genre, add to the compelling nature of the ensemble cast, and to the sense of danger all around.

For a first novel, I found it impressive. There were times when I considered the beats and plot points perhaps a little too hardly driven home, but better to err in the direction of clarity than of confusion. And while I had trouble integrating some of the backstory, the foreshadowing of danger around the corner and rising conflict to come was excellently handled. All in all a very solid, entertaining read that I find easy to recommend to teens from thirteen on up and to the YA crowd. Even younger readers in the ten to twelve year range should easily be drawn in to this family-friendly tale, and enjoy the third member of the team, Morlok, who reminded me a little of the Cheshire cat of Alice in Wonderland, the way he was described. Though he's very much his own, delightfully well imagined creature that even younger readers should gravitate to.

Dragon Rising is an exciting and action-packed fantasy novel, which is probably one of the better ones in the genre that I've read this year. "*Dragon Rising*" by Tom Fallwell is an interesting story, replete with Dark Lords, hidden Rebels, unlikely Heroes, beautiful maidens, fantastic magic, woodlands full of Elves and of course Dragons. It falls perfectly into the 'Sword and Sorcery' genre and as I am a lifelong fan of this type of story I eagerly placed a copy on my Kindle.

The tale opens rapidly and we are introduced to Delina, a half elf with oddly shaped eyes and her friend and protector Morlock, a giant shadowfang cat from the far southern jungles. Delina's slight frame belies her great strength and cat-like agility and she and Morlock hunt together almost as one.

Just as quickly we are exposed to the brooding, malevolent presence of Kargoth, the self proclaimed Dark Lord of Almar and his obsession with power and hatred of the Fellowship of the Blood, the last remnant of

Rebels who still remain loyal to the memory of the Dragon King Jeraldin whom Kargoth betrayed and slew nearly twenty years past.

Kargoth's Blackguard search ceaselessly for the stronghold of the Fellowship and by unfortunate chance they come upon a lone young warrior, Merric, just recently turned seventeen, as he ventures through the land. He is attacked and only saved, thru pure luck, by Delina and Morlock, in whose cave he takes refuge just moments before the blackguard come upon him. Merric is gravely wounded but Delina is wise in the ways of healing and she and Merric and Morlock soon become friendly as they nurse Merric back to health.

The story picks up rapidly from there, with Delina's true nature revealed thru the fulfillment of an ancient prophesy and the great struggle between the Fellowship, Elves, Humans and the forces of the Dark Lord comprise the remainder of this epic tale. Delina's true nature comes to her in stages and her quest to discover more about her hidden power propels the plot and story-line to its conclusion.

Fans of this genre will not be disappointed in this effort, though there is little novelty in the characters or the central conflict. There are Elves hidden in the Sylvan forests, a Dark Lord in his great black stronghold, an alliance of men and other races formed to defend the forces of Light and swords and magic aplenty.

Echos of Zelazny, and Tolkien and even a touch of Rowling can be detected and Mr. Fallwell's prose does them justice. I gave the story a rating of three stars, mostly because of the very linear and somewhat overly pat plot-line and some of the rather improbable coincidences that are employed to connect several scenes.

There is a great deal of repetitive explanation and over exposition that with a through editing could be condensed, allowing the more interesting character dialog and interaction to assume center stage. Overall I did enjoy this story, and as there are some obvious dangling hooks for several follow-on tales I eagerly await the continuation of this adventure series.

What I enjoyed most about Fallwell's story is the fresh view of dragons. Having read a number of the existing dragon series, Fallwell's concept provides a nice alternative to how dragons might exist with humans and other creatures.

The story moves quickly and covers a lot of ground without missing anything important, which I like. The descriptions painted a vivid picture and I enjoyed the variation in creatures from other series I've read. There are three primary species (humans, elves, and the desert-dwellers) and some similarities to other tales, but again, Fallwell crafted the story with a unique overall tale that kept my interest.

While I can tell Fallwell has a grasp of solid writing, the book could use a bit of polish. On the whole, I don't feel like this distracted from the story, though.

I'm very curious to see how Delina continues to grow and evolve if Fallwell chooses to write another book about this world. The characters were appealing and I found myself cheering for them from early in the story.
