There is a phenomenon called "New Science" that interprets everything in terms of unproven evolutionary origins. This book falls prey to that kind of thinking. Believe me, we should beware of "New Science" because the Old Science is still the best. New Science seems to be trendy pop science that validates trendy pop prejudices.

This book is entertaining reading for bedtime or commode-time. One "fact" leads to the next by association. If one item incidentally introduces the topic of water, the next item might focus on some factoid having to do with water, and so on. Read one after another, the great danger is that your head will be filled with this tripe and yet you will not consciously remember any of the items.
