I enjoyed "In the Doctor's Bed." It had me on tender-hooks. I saw the correlation between the drug abuse charge and the doctors' fraternization. They were both addicted, and could not give up their vices. I only wish the book was longer, so that Brenda Jackson could expand on the drug case. I felt that it was not resolved. What was the outcome? Is this book part of a series? I felt like two issues were left up in the air. Was Dr. Dudley and Nurse Tsang having an affair? (A couple of hints throughout the book made me think that they were, but nothing ever came of it). The other issue was Dr. Terrance Matthews' lawsuit against Lucien and the hospital. I know Lucien spoke to a lawyer, but will Dr. Matthews drop his lawsuit, or is he still going through with it? Will Dr. Matthews family admit that their son has a drug problem? I guess since it's a Silhouette romance there's a certain number of pages you have to write for that publication.

I did like the love story though between the two doctors: Jaclyn and Lucien. I also liked that Lucien was Jamaican. Brenda Jackson knows how to write drama, intrigue, and foreshadowing effectively. I kept looking around waiting for someone to catch Jaclyn and Lucien fraternizing; like a private investigator hired by Terrance Matthew's rich and powerful family.
