RM Hamrick takes this already creative and interesting premise to its next logical and compelling step. Survivors, desperate for money or desperate to cure their loved ones (or both), are recruited to find the zombified loved ones of those with enough money to pay for the cure. Hooked into a form of indentured servitude designed to push them further under the heel of the post-apocalyptic 1%ers.

While *Chasing a Cure* is a very satisfying read on its own, I'm very interested in finding out how the story-lines laid out within it play out. I hope there will be more!

In R.M. Hamrick's *Chasing a Cure: A Zombie Novel*, a virus has infected mankind which renders its victims still living, and recoverable, counterparts to the classic shambling zombie. The Lysent corporation has developed a cure that reverses the effects of the virus (though not any damage the "zombie" may have incurred shambling around in the interim) for a price. Lysent has setup a system wherein a loved one can offer a bounty on a specific infected person, and freelance taggers (using leased company equipment) race to fill tagging quotas by hunting down infected and transmitting their DNA back to the company in hopes of hitting on someone with a wealthy family who wants the infected back.

Audra is one such tagger seeking to collect enough bounties to pay off the cost of curing her infected sister. She quickly realizes that the system is designed to keep taggers like her in an open-ended indentured servitude. Never able to make up any ground on their debt. Always in hock to the company store. Once the realization dawns that there aren't enough bounties in the world to make up her debt, Audra is forced to find a different route to freeing her sister from her shambling prison.

Social commentary has been part of the zombie genre going all the way back to Romero. It's one of the things that sets zombies apart from other classic monsters. Whether it's Romero's critique of consumerism or Hamrick's positing that corporate capitalism will shamble out of any grave it's put in and be as insatiable and single-minded as any zombie, social commentary adds layers to stories that would otherwise be one-

dimensional splatterfests. In the case of *Chasing a Cure: A Zombie Novel*, the commentary is well done and I think it's the outstanding aspect of the story. I hope this is the first in a series of books exploring this idea.
