June Foster handles addictions, family dysfunctions, and physical abnormalities with loving and respectful sensitivity. What I like best about this little romance is that it doesn't present a picture perfect heroine or hero - a standard none of us can reach. Instead of making the reader yearn for the perfect, beautiful man who doesn't exist, she gives us a picture of two imperfect people learning to love each other in the Lord, the way He intended.

This is an inspirational and very heartwarming story.

People with issues—some are self-imposed, and others are forced upon us. Dealing with self-image, addiction, dysfunctional family, and guilt are among the problems Jess and Holly have to deal with in order to find the happiness they both seek.

Thrown together in an unexpected situation, the dental hygienist and computer programmer, both Christians, are attracted to one another, but each has their doubts as to their own worthiness to be loved by the other.

Jess' obesity is creating more problems for him than just the cruel comments people throw at him. Holly's past and its consequences haunt her as she falls deeper in love with this kind and gentle man.

As Jess Colton overcame his addiction to alcohol he developed a strong faith in God. Unfortunately the addiction to alcohol was replaced by an addiction to overeating. His resulting obesity threatens not only his life but his career. His poor self image is fueled by rude and insensitive comments and degrading looks from others, including his own father.

Holly Harrison has a past that haunts her, and a sister who routinely reminds her of that fact. A past motorcycle accident left her with a partial leg amputation, creating the need for her to wear a prosthesis. She had strayed from her Christian beliefs and hadn't attended church in several years. Her disability and lack of

faith resulted in the belief that she isn't worthy of love.

Holly and Jess meet when stuck in an elevator in their apartment building. Holly panics and Jess comforts her and prays with her. Holly leans on Jess, and in a weak moment promises Jess she will attend church with him if they are ever released from their "prison." Holly is attracted to his beautiful blue eyes and warm and comforting personality, and during their imprisonment Holly and Jess become friends. As their friendship blossoms into a relationship, the challenges of their respective disabilities become obstructions which threaten their happiness and possible future together.

June Foster has broached numerous sensitive topics in "Give Us This Day," issues of addiction, obesity, disabilities, prejudice, dysfunctional families and loss of Christian faith. These topics are presented in a very open and insightful manner. Her characters are believable and their obstacles are realistically portrayed through events with which many readers can identify. The openness regarding these topics may be helpful to readers who struggle with some of the issues discussed in this book. The progression through insecurities and addiction in this book are impressive.

Just as Jesus spoke in parables to teach his disciples, so can an author of Christian fiction weave threads of truth throughout a story, providing the reader a thoughtful experience in addition to a pleasant read.

Such is the case with *Give Us This Day* by June Foster. This character-driven novel introduces us to Jess Dalton and Holly Harrison as they become trapped together inside an elevator at the apartment complex where they both live. Bonded by their experience, they move beyond acquaintances to become friends - safe friends, because each is certain that his/her flaws guarantee that the other would never consider a romantic relationship.

For Jess, it is his weight. He successfully quit drinking upon becoming a Christian, but he now weighs more than 300 pounds, a result of replacing alcohol with a food addiction. He despises who he has become and his self-loathing is compounded by the insensitive comments others make, yet he continues to turn to food to cope. Completely discouraged, he is convinced that no woman will ever love him, certainly not one as lovely as Holly.

Holly feels unworthy of love due to her prosthetic leg, a constant reminder of a time in her life when she had strayed from God's path. Although she sees beyond Jess's outward appearance and is drawn to his kindness and gentle ways, her shame and guilt keep her from revealing her scars to him, certain that he would reject her.

Give Us This Day is a charming story that illustrates how internal issues can keep an individual from accepting the grace s/he offers to others. Foster writes with sensitivity as she demonstrates the inner battles with which Jess and Holly wrestle, as well as the hope and fresh starts within their reach. Far from being a heavy or preachy book, however, this book can be equally enjoyed by readers simply looking for an satisfying story as well as those who like a bit more depth in their leisure pursuits.

Holly Harrison meets kind, good-looking, if very overweight Jess Colton when they are stranded in the elevator in their apartment building. He helps her to get through her attack of claustrophobia and fear by praying for her, and shows what a nice guy he is. Once they are rescued from the elevator, Jess invites her to go to church with him. Holly became a Christian years ago, but she listened to her sister's insistence that God wouldn't forgive her for the sins she had committed while in college, so she stopped going to church, praying and reading her Bible. Jess's encouragement and spiritual counseling helps Holly to get back in a close relationship with the Lord, and she starts to fall in love with the gentle, beautiful man. His weight doesn't matter to her. She sees the loving person inside, and is drawn to him for his love for God and the warm friendship he shows her. Even though she knows that he probably wouldn't want damaged goods like herself.

Jess falls in love at first sight with Holly, but more importantly, he reaches out to the lonely, unhappy young woman with the love of Christ. While others seem repelled and critical of his weight, she shows him loving friendship and support. He knows that no woman would want him with his large body and his addiction to food. All he can do is take comfort in their friendship, even if he wants more in his heart. But what can he offer to her when it turns out that with his weight issues, his health is a ticking clock getting closer to eternity?

Review

Give Us This Day was a very touching novel about the relationship between two lonely people who felt deeply unworthy inside, despite their relationship with Christ. I appreciated that God brought them together so they could help each other through their mutual issues with feeling loved and accepted. Additionally, it was refreshing to read a book where the couple falling in love aren't drop dead gorgeous or without flaws, and they love each other for what they see inside, as well for their mutual love for Christ.

The story touched me deeply, both from a spiritual and emotional perspective. Jess was a very good man, and it was painful to see how people treated him because of his weight, as if he was disgusting and inferior and undeserving of respect. Foster ably conveys the message about God's love for all people, and that he accepts us as we are. Jess's struggles with an alcohol addiction that he substituted with food because of feeling a lack of acceptance from his hypercritical father resonated with me. His process of turning that addiction over to God and seeking his help to recover from it, was a powerful message to me of God's ability to heal all our wounds and to be our sufficiency in a fallen world. In the case of Holly, I was reminded that God's love is unconditional, that there is no sin he won't forgive and that we don't need to feel unworthy of his love and fellowship because of mistakes we make, past or future.

At times, I feel as though Christian fiction can be all about a message with no story to go with it. With *Give Us This Day*, I felt that the message was seamlessly intertwined with an involving story. I rooted for Jess and Holly to find their happy ending together, even as I appreciated the spiritual truths and insights given in this novella. I loved how in the midst of their struggles, these characters were able to find comfort in each other, and from the people in their lives (both Christian and non-Christian), but also to help those who didn't know and appreciate God's unconditional love as a gift available to all.

There are very few, if any romance books that feature an overweight hero or even a hero who struggles with weight issues, so this book serves as a very good trailblazer for a needed genre today. I found that I loved Jess for his whole being as I read this novella. While I felt pain for his emotional issues that led to his obesity and worried about his health, his weight didn't diminish his attractiveness to me as a person. It wasn't hard to see why Holly fell in love with him. I definitely see this as being realistic, because many people don't just look for the perfect physical specimen, either because they have gone down that path and been disappointed or because they know all along their soulmate won't come in that package. They look to the heart for a person who they feel safe and loved with. *Give Us This Day* is the book for those readers. And for readers who want a great romance with an effective and non-preachy Christian message. I recommend reading it.
