I received this book as a good reads free book. The cover immediately got my attention and I eagerly began reading. The first chapter set the tone for the book. There would be mystery and intrigue mixed with the history. My kind of book.

While the story was enjoyable and well-researched, I did find that some of the incidents our characters were caught up in fall a little short. For example, I would have liked to see the battle scenes told from one person's point of view with more emphasis on the sights, sounds and smells of the battle instead of short sections for each. It seems as if there are three or four stories intertwined. But that is my personal preference and may not bother other readers.

A couple of other items pertaining to editing bothered me as well. The double spacing between each paragraph interrupted the flow of the story. Perhaps using that technique when switching characters may have been good, but not between each paragraph.

The second item is the spelling of one of the character's name. When we first meet the nurse, she is called Rachael. A little further the spelling is changed to Rachel. I had to go back to see if this was still the same character. These two spellings are used interchangeable throughout the book.

I don't mean to be negative. I did enjoy the story. It is well-paced and holds the readers' interests.

It doesn't say anywhere but it seems this was written with tweens in mind. And, as such, it is a good read.

They would not be bothered by my minor hang-ups.

I'm looking forward to finding out what did happen to Oliver.

Quite enjoyed this. Great stuff. Worth reading/buying. I was a bit overwhelmed at first with the number of characters, but they quickly started to make themselves distinct. By about 40% in I didn't want to put this story down. The further you get into the novella, the more tightly written and visceral it becomes until at the end you're fully present with Jacob and Rachael and Oliver and Sarah as they follow their stories.

I don't think the story of Jesse is needed. There's so little time to develop his character that he comes across as two-dimensional and there's no real connection to his character, so I wasn't really invested in what happened to him and the actions he took. I'd say if this were developed into a longer novel, this storyline could be developed but it doesn't feel needed to me. It's enough for Rebecca and Oliver to meet and follow that storyline, which I felt was fantastic. Plus, I think the parade of characters in the tavern at the beginning would be helped by at least one less person.

I picked up the second book and while I haven't looked at it yet, I'm hoping that I get to be with these characters again.
