I tried - too - hard to like it, but it wouldn't come. I liked the pirate, not so much the hunter, but I warmed up to him a little bit by the end of the book.

I don't know what grated on me, there wasn't anything wrong in the writing, but the way the protagonists spoke - alternating between pirate-talk and gangster-talk - ripped me out of the story with every line. I think it was supposed to sound fun, but mixing a little bit of historical in a sci-fi setting, with the odd words here and there made me feel confused and honestly it made me feel anxious.

The last chapters were not bad, with the confrontation between good and bad guy, but by then I was bored and uninterested. I read other contemporary books by the same author, and they struck me for being light, sexy and funny, but I couldn't find the same things here. I think it depended on the beginning after Aidan's rescue and the passage from historical to sci-fi. The story seemed suddenly infused with a heaviness that I couldn't shed until later in the book.

We have an alien bounty hunter, Talos, who was sent back in time to grab Captain Aiden Maymon to help search for treasure he had buried. Now, the cover is seriously bad, but it does a good job of depicting how Talos was described. That ugly alien on the cover? Fits this book perfectly.

And then we have Aiden, yeah yeah, he could be compared to a certain pirate we all know and love. But what other pirate am I supposed to imagine? I don't have much background in this so when someone says pirate, I think Jack. Even so, Aiden was a really fun character who immediately causes tons of mischief for Talos to deal with. What I learned - you can take a pirate with a very familiar swagger and speech pattern, pair him with a time-traveling alien that talks like a bad actor in a 1920s gangster film while using present-day slang, and people will rave about the novel, calling Jack Sp-- I mean, Aidan Maymon, unforgettable and unique. He's unforgettable because he was shamelessly based on the star of a little-known Disney movie, called Pirates of the something-or-another. Anyway, back to the novel.

The quality of the book is sub-par, unless by some chance I was reading a proof copy. The text was unjustified, which strikes me as cheap considering the price tag. I suspected a vanity publisher. There are spelling and grammar errors, which is unsurprising given that the copy editors are paid in proof copies and nothing else.

On to the writing... The story is laid out with every fact presented right when you need it, meaning that each reference to an alien race or technology or even other characters is helpfully followed by a lengthy, textbook description of said object/person, which derails whatever narrative was going on in the background. The dialogue is unbelievable and painful to read between the ripoffs of Jack Sparrow's speech and mannerisms and Talos, the alien's supposed gangster-inspired phrases interspersed with language that a teen would use to

anger his parents. The premise for the plot was thin and a hefty suspension of disbelief is always required when time travel is involved. It's erotica so the creative sex scenes involving prehensile penises might be worth reading the book for, but that's about all the enjoyment you'll get out of it.

End result - good for a few laughs if you can read it in a short time. Otherwise, move along.
