This is a quick and surprisingly enjoyable read about murder and obsession. The story revolves around six Hemmingway impersonators' successful attempt to contact the spirit of "the Man" on the grounds of his former residence in the Florida Keys. Ernest Hemmingway's unhappy ghost begs for help and reveals clues about lost letters, perhaps even an unpublished book. Dazzled by their shared admiration for "the Man", but more tantalized by prospects of wealth, the impersonators seek out Hemmingway's lost papers. They find more than they bargained for. One by one, they die violently. Fear and suspicion run rampant, but so do greed and curiosity.

Hemingway's Ghost is billed as a novella, but the pacing is closer to that of a short story, possible to read in one sitting. I enjoyed the brevity and spare detail because it kept the plot moving quickly and was a tip of the hat to Hemmingway's own distinct style.
