Legends of the Ferengi feels exactly like its species: amusing in short bursts and grating in larger doses. The book is full of assorted lists, letters, instructions, and anecdotes, each representing a different Rule of Acquisition. Not all the rules are included, but there are enough to remind us that the Ferengi are a greedy, sexist, xenophobic culture consistently played for laughs. But the joke's on us: as Quark glibly reminds us on the final page, "Deep down, everyone's a Ferengi."

A wonderful piece of meta fiction, Star Trek: Deep Space Nine – Legends of the Ferengi is incredibly fun and entertaining. The book is essentially a collection of short stories and fables that either illustrate, or are the basis for, the Ferengi Rules of Acquisition. And while they're "told to" Quark by series producer Ira Steven Behr and writer Robert Hewitt Wolfe, they're not cannon and aren't supposed to be taken seriously. By listing Quark as the author the reader is told right upfront the sort of tongue-in-cheek kind of humor that they're in for. The stories are really just a clever lark that plays off of the goofiness of the Ferengi. Worth its weight in latinum, Star Trek: Deep Space Nine – Legends of the Ferengi explores the lighter side of Trek and delivers a lot of laughs.

For me this book was hit and miss. It's handy to have the rules written down in one place, and the book is often funny, clever, and even genuinely insightful, but it is also often unfunny, creepy (the sexism of the Ferengi is less amusing without the skilled actors to back it up), and dated. That being said, if you are a big fan of the Ferengi on DS9 it is worth checking out or keeping for reference. As for entertainment value though, I would recommend the audiobook version over this. It is technically abridged, which I usually hate, but this is not a novel with any plot and what little was left out was not some of the better material, and the very funny performance of Armin Shimerman (same actor who played Quark) lifts the material to greater heights, not to mention the music, sound effects, additional voices from Shimerman, material unique to the audio version, and at least one additional actor.

If you're open to a non-traditional reading experience I recommend what I did: listen to the audiobook and then skim through the original for remaining material, although if you're not a completist like me, you may be able to do the audio version only, which is available through hoopla digital if your library is using the service.
