Like all the Bond books, I have read this one several times. This rereading I found simultaneously more and less satisfying than previous ones. Between readings I had seen a number of negative reviews of this installment in Gardner's continuation of the 007 series. While I do tend to agree that the presence of Margaret Thatcher, George H.W. Bush, and Mikhail Gorbachev seems to be a little bit forced, I also find that the characters of Pennington and Deeley work quite well. Similarly, Baradj in the guise of an idealistic terrorist who is really just out to make his own fortune is a good touch, and probably honest. The Bond books are never going to be entirely satisfying as works of literature. But I found them fun to read for more than 40 years so ...

I don't know what to think of Gardner's Bond. It seems when he is good, the books are awesome, but when he falls short they really tend to fall apart.

This is the second modern Terrorist organization he tackles, Scorpius being the first, which is fantastic. This one even brings us into the modern era with Prime Minister Maggie Thatcher, President George H.W. Bush, and Russian Leader Gorbachev, with a reference to President Reagan.

But the story seems far fetched and obscene in places like mentioned in the other reviews on this book. I was really disappointed, and am about to head into another film adaptation that I didn't like in the theater... License to Kill, great concept but really fell short in my opinion.

Bob Garrett says

WIN, LOSE OR DIE is John Gardner's eighth James Bond novel, and... I'll admit that a certain fatigue is setting in – not necessarily on Gardner's part, but on mine. Gardner doesn't write Bond novels so much as he writes mystery novels with James Bond in them, and all the mysteries and plot twists are beginning to wear me out. Now, with each new-to-me installment, I mostly just try to guess which of Bond's love interests will prove to be a villain (I guessed right this time!).

That said, WIN, LOSE OR DIE does include a novel treat for Bond fans: We see Bond back in the Navy and promoted to Captain. M learns of a plot against a United Kingdom aircraft carrier with visiting U.K., American and Soviet dignitaries, and thus, Bond comes aboard as a naval officer, charged with protecting said dignitaries. It was an interesting idea, and I largely enjoyed the execution.

The book had other high points. One of Bond's relationships seemed a little more meaningful than usual and was well handled. Gardner seems to have done some research on contemporary naval technology, which adds authenticity to the proceedings. The climax is fairly well staged, and there are cameos by some distinguished political figures (no spoilers here).

Ultimately, however, WIN, LOSE OR DIE sinks due to a bland villain with a stupid, stupid STOOPID scheme. Bond himself explains why the villain won't get what he wants, even if his plans are successful. I'm sorry, Mr. Gardner, but... pointing out the stupid logic in the story doesn't make it "okay." I can buy, perhaps, that the main villain might be delusional enough to go through with such a plan, but then, I'd also have to buy that he can convince an army of followers to do likewise.

So far, I'd say that ROLE OF HONOUR, NOBODY LIVES FOREVER and NO DEALS, MR. BOND are Gardner's three best Bond novels. These were his fourth, fifth and sixth ones, and I'm beginning to wonder if he peaked there. I have six more left to read, so I'm really hoping that things get better.

This could be a good book but Gardner was not really a good writer, well for this book. He could have made the story more interesting but he did not. Some of the parts are not really interesting and very strange. Take for example, the part about two of the organisation members having a talk together, how could they not possibly not know that the British Secret service had been bugging the when they have the ability to start their operation "WIN" and "LOSE"?

However, although it gets off to a slow start, I would have to say that (so far) "Win, Lose or Die" is arguably a highlight of the Gardner books. It is also the only one that I feel could actually work as a Bond film. The characters are a bit more respectable than most of Gardner's creations, especially his usual cookie-cutter villains. The book also carries some of the wonderful, sinister, almost supernatural imagery that Fleming was

so fond of, portraying Bond and the other characters as players in a strange spiritual plane that seems to stretch beyond Earthly bonds.

Now, if only Gardner could have learned to do away with all those...one-liners he has Bond spout after he does something. This is supposed to be Fleming's Bond, not Roger Moore's. Furthermore, the book continues to slip with the horrid scenes in which Bond interacts with M and Bill Tanner. In Fleming's books, M was a man of few words, and when he said something, it was to the point and deadly serious. Unfortunately, Gardner again sinks to the level of having Bond and M trade barbs, if you will. Fleming's Bond would NEVER smart off to his boss the way Gardner's does.

However, once you get past the tepid first third of the novel, the narrative really picks up. This book actually has enough high points to outweigh the low points. The section where Bond is used as bait at the Italian villa is almost up to Fleming's speed. And the climax aboard the hijacked carrier is absolutely spellbinding.

This is John Gardner's ninth addition to the James Bond series – if you include the novelisation of Licence to Kill – and sees the hero promoted to captain. A new terrorist organisation, BAST, has appeared and following a daring, but ultimately unsuccessful attack upon a super tanker in the Persian Gulf the world's intelligence agencies are awake to the threat that they pose. When M receives information that the failed super tanker raid was a dry run for a real attack upon HMS Invincible Bond is returned to active service within the Royal Navy so he will be in position should BAST try to cause any trouble.

HMS Invincible is due to take part in a NATO exercise during which a top secret meeting between Mrs Thatcher, President Bush and President Gorbachev to speed up the thawing of relations as the Cold War draws to a close and Bond is placed in charge of the security for the duration of their visit.

This is not a bad story, although the ease that BAST are able to gather top secret information to plan the mission and then place their terrorists aboard one of the Royal Navy's capital ships is ludicrous even by the standards of Bond stories. Even with that flaw, this could still have been so much better had Gardner not persisted in constantly having people appear as double- and even triple-agents; it has happened so many times the novelty has well and truly worn off by now and he should have stopped a couple of books ago.
