Mama likey. First, the title is fantastic. The projects are all practical, and the book is wonderful to look through. I would like to try a couple of the projects, especially the baby book. It also got my creative juices flowing about a new bag for Annie's dance shoes and gear.

The projects kind of have a split personality in that some are really cute and the rest are really weird and/or ugly. I like most of the bags a lot. There's a really nice large camera bag as rare as it is these days for someone to have an SLR camera. The sleeping eye mask is nice and I use an eyemask every night. The baby's first book is delightful but there's a reason they're not made of felt and sewn on images. As long as the baby is supervised with the book, it's an adorable project.

The heirloom duvet cover is so far from it's name it belongs on Regretsy. I think they're supposed to be flower petals but they look like blobs. The instructions are good with nice illustrations of placement of the massive number of appliques in the book for each project but sorely lacking in any other images. The child's apron is kind of strange.

And there is entirely too much applique. Almost every single project has applique. There are other ways to embellish and sometimes you don't need to embellish at all.

One useful thing is a great chart that shows you exactly how much yardage is needed for pillow inserts of varying sizes.

So good job on instructions, inconsistent job on the projects.

I like the book but I have to say I was a bit disappointed after finally getting hold of it. The projects are not very original although many come with a twist, mostly appliques. If you would like to learn how to applique, this may be an interesting book for you although the patterns, like the projects, are again not terribly imaginative. However, I do like several projects, notably the wall clock (very nice design), the garden skirt (cover photo) and baby's first book (very cute, very adaptable for other crafts - and non-sewing - projects).

The instructions are very clear although very long and intimidating at first glance as most project steps are not accompanied by illustrations. I would have preferred more diagrams to accompany all those words.

Overall, a good book with some pretty projects but not very special if you're familiar with sewing books and blogs.
