Perhaps the sales were lagging, who knows?

Even though we follow an alternate version of the duo, the dialogue is spot-on, which makes this virtually impossible to read without hearing all the character voices in your head. And that's one neat trick, if you ask me, which make these graphic novels well worth seeking out, even though the individual stories aren't all that compelling.

My only real complaint is they tried to cram too many stories into this slim volume—half of the issues had a tiny four-page Summer or Beth side adventure squeezed in at the end—so the storytelling felt rushed. I would have preferred a single story arc stretched over the entire volume to all those little snippets.

But anyhow, sorry about that dark opening—I must have been channeling my inner Rick—please allow me to redeem myself by ending this review on a positive note.

Believe it or not, your perception of time is skewed. Ever wonder why those summers of your youth seemed to last forever?
