The Doctor and Charley find themselves aboard a salvage ship attempting to recover an abandoned destroyer. But when the crew discovers that the ship's original owners, the Cybermen, haven't actually abandoned ship, everyone is in danger.

This episode is an interesting melange of classic and new Who. It fits both in the Patrick Troughton era and arguably ties in well to Matt Smith's most recent outing by Neil Gaiman.

That said, while the Cybermen are generally well handled, the cover again spoils the villain, thereby disenfranchising attentive listeners who hope to figure out who the villain is on their own. Also, There's a side plot relating to the title, but it's marginal and fumbled. Plus, both my wife and I had it figured out well before the actual twist occurred.

Still, as accompaniment in your car or otherwise passing the time when you can't read or watch, it's not bad.

As you can see from the cover, the Cybermen are involved, but they don't really show up until the end of the second part/third part. It still is a wonderful audio adventure. It is very creepy and the setting is an amazing setting for a cybermen story. It's hard to really explain much, but one notable thing is that there is a very interesting side-story about Android wars, which I hope some day Big Finish gets too. But otherwise this is a fantastically eerie audio and I would greatly recommend it, one of my all time favorites!

The first hour of this audio really spins its wheels in the mud of going through the movements. However, when the second hour starts up, things move along nicely, and while the whole thing is a bit predictable, it's still quite a good listen.

The picture on the cover tells you that Cybermen are involved, but it takes quite awhile before the Cybermen show up. Until that point there's a plot involving the TARDIS getting accidentally loaded onto a salvage ship, and some smugglers going after a derelict space ship, and the TARDIS ending up on the derelict, I think because the salvage ship slammed on the brakes too hard. Or something.

This is one of those stories where you have to be paying close attention to figure out where the characters are at any given moment, who's actually talking, and what, exactly is going on. And then it turns out it doesn't really matter anyway, because RAAAAR! CYBERMEN! And a lot of time is spent screaming.

It's a shame that the chief baddies of Doctor Who are antagonists who are difficult to understand -- Cybermen and Daleks.

Charley's presence here is practically unnecessary. She doesn't do much, and you have to wonder why she isn't alternately frozen in wonder or horror at what she's experiencing. After all, she's just been whisked away from earth by a madman with a box. She certainly adjusts quickly! But I suppose you can't have the doctor just talking to himself all the time.

So there's a secret agent, and a double agent, or maybe a triple agent . . . like I said -- pay attention! It'll probably be better on a second listen anyway. Not the best of the 8th Doctor audios, but certainly not awful, because hey, Doctor Who . . . and Cybermen!
