I love the Olympics, I love the Winter Olympics, I love romance books, sports romances, and books set in foreign countries.

So when I came across Medal Up, a duo of romance set to the back drop of this years 2018 Pyeongchang Winter Olympics in South Korea I couldn't resist purchasing and taking a look.

These are two separate novellas that interlink, from different point of views, written by two different authors. Each of them focuses on a different partnership. Between the two books we are introduced to snowboarder Brady, ice-skater Arielle both of who are determined to win gold in their events, and then Bohdan and Maybell who are a ice skating partnership, but are they more.

I loved the descriptions of the Olympic village and even for non sports fans, the level of sport in the books is accessible. There aren't too many of the tricks, or twists or jumps named so especially with Brady you don't need to worry about snowboarding language.

There are all sorts of threads weaved into these novellas, and I found that Fighting Their Attraction was the hot and steamy book of the pair, while Man of Ice had quite a bit more depth to the story.

Incredibly enjoyable set of stories that were just what I needed to relax with after a particularly trying day.

Of course I like it.

I was going to do a review for Nicole Flockton's story, Fighting Their Attraction, but it is so intertwined with the companion novella, I wondered how I could do it.

The two novellas are more like one book about two couples at the Olympics with four points of view. We get to see Brady and Arielle's point of view in the first novella. Then you get Bohdan and Maybelle's point of view in the second novella.

Both couples are experiencing the Olympics at the same time, going to many of the same events, socializing at many of the same places yet have different stories.

I really enjoyed Brady and Arielle's story. They are two distinct characters with their own history and issues. How these are resolved over the course of the story, while they face the heart-racing challenges of competing for gold at the Olympics makes for a fast and exciting read. Not only do we get to watch their romance, we get to have a ringside seat and even closer, seeing them compete against the best in the world.

And of course then you get to read my story about pairs skating couple who are just at the beginning of their partnership, competing against well established couples for a medal place.

These are two well-written novellas that work seamlessly together to tell the story of two friends competing at the Winter Games in Korea. Flockton's story, Fighting Their Attraction, tells about Brady--an Australian skater turned snowboarder with a lot of baggage in his past. He has an instant attraction to newcomer Arielle, a Canadian skater, but can he make amends with his former friends and himself enough to let himself love Arielle before it's too late? In Marsden's Man of Ice, Belle and Bohdan work well together on the ice, but can they both let go of family pain and guilt enough to have a partnership off the ice? Belle just happens to be one of Brady's former skating friends so the two stories cover the same timeline and the authors did a good job of marrying up the encounters between the two. These were fun, heartwarming stories and I'm especially glad that I read them just in time to watch the Winter Games. I'll be watching some of the skaters and snowboarders and wondering what their stories look like and if any are similar to any of the characters I met in these stories.

I was so excited that Nicole Flockton was back with a new Olympic Games love story! She does such a fabulous job packing an emotional punch in her novellas. In these winter-based Games, she gives us Brady, a tormented ex-pairs skater turned snowboarder, and Arielle, a beautiful figure skater, who try and fail to fight the attraction that is so palpable. We get all the soul searching, emotional growth, torment, and love that you'd expect from their journey to happily ever after. I dearly loved these characters and wanted nothing more than for them to find themselves and each other through the pressure of expectations and need to conform.

Man of Ice - 4 Stars

In the second half of this set, we are formally introduced to Maybelle, Brady's old partner, and Bohdan, her new partner. I could tell from the glimpses we were given during the first book that this was going to be fun. These two had a unique relationship. This book contains two novellas set at the 2018 Winter Olympics in Korea.

The first story is about Arielle, a figure skater and Brady a snowboarder who used to be a figure skater. I really loved the pacing of this story. It was realistic and moved the story along appropriately. The characters were realistic and interesting, and it really felt like they belonged together. Finally the sequence of events felt reasonable for athletes at the Olympics.

The second story tells of Maybelle and Bohdan's relationship. They have been pairs figure skating partners for months, but are really no closer to knowing each other than they were the first day.

This story had a faster pace, but I really liked how the story concentrated mainly on the emotion within the relationship. The characters and situations were again realistic and these were also heart warming as the characters got to know each other and found they had more things in common than they thought.

One of the best parts of this duology is how well the two stories work together. The first story introduces all the characters and the friendship problem/situation that needs resolution carries through both stories seamlessly, almost as though one author had written both. Flockton and Marsden have done a fabulous job providing readers with realistic entertaining Olympic stories.
