Gotrek, after having taken quite a serious turn in my opinion since Nathan Long took on his character, is once again laughing maniacally and grinning in an unsettling manner in the face of danger. I love the scene where they are being attacked by sharks and Gotrek is roaring at them to come out of the water and face him, the cowards. The humour is definitely back in the series and the book is so much better for it. And Felix is back being a lovable idiot when it comes to matters of the curvy, feminine kind.

What I find interesting about Nathan Long is that he seems to reference the earlier books much more than William King did. There is a lot of looking back and tying things together a little more. I think Nathan Long "gets" the series at last. That or he's written enough for me to get used to his style. Either way, it was a tough transition from William King's original writing. The first couple by Long just didn't work for me for some reason. The characters weren't as enjoyable and the dialog seemed forced. And this was after I thoroughly enjoyed his "Black Hearts" series so I knew he could write (Please Mr. Long, don't forget about those guys... I'd love another book in that run). My only complaint with this one was the handling of the wizard Max. It had been several years (and novels) since he'd made an appearance, yet for some reason, he was fairly pathetic. His power was growing when we last saw him, yet in this book he seemed little changed. Teclis he's not, but still, I expected some fairly impressive spell casting by now. However, all we got were magic missiles and colored bolts.

Other than this small complaint, the book was fast paced and filled with tons of carnage. As usual, the Slayer did what he does best... slew and slew some more. As usual, Felix tagged along for the ride and managed some good deeds as well. We got a few more hints dropped about that these two are "marked" for some dramatic battle (Like what they've done up to this point wasn't tough enough...) and are being kept alive through some magical means for a crazy climatic finish. I mean a greater daemon of Slaanesh bowed out of combat with Gotrek because something even more powerful had laid claim to the dwarf. How cool was that? What this great doom entails, I guess we'll have to wait and see.

Not sure what's left for these two... Trolls, check, Giants, check, Dragons, check, Daemons, check, vampires, check, Orcs, check, Elves, check, Skaven, Check What is next? I'm trying to remember, but I don't think they've fought Lizardmen yet. It would be cool to see them head to Lustria to take on a some giant undead Slann... oh and for Sigmar's sake, please bring back Snorri Nosebiter.

Gotrek is a slayer dwarf, one who has committed a sin so great the only atonement is seeking out an death in battle worthy of an epic. Felix is a poet and swordsman who is wanted by the Empire for his participation in the window tax riots. Gotrek saved Felix's life from being trampled by the Empire's troops. While hiding in a tavern, very inebriated Felix swears an oath to follow the slayer dwarf and write the epic of his death. In this series of books the duo fight; chaos worshipers, goblin wolf riders, trolls, cultists, beastmen, sorcerers, skaven, a deamon, a dragon, a vampire, giants, men, a wizard, orcs, dark elves, and the undead and a necromancer. Through all of this Gotrek wonders if he will ever find his doom, Felix wonders if Gotrek's doom will be the end of him and if he is crazy for standing at the Slayer's side for as long as it takes. This series was started by William King and is continued by Nathan Long. These were the first books of the Warhammer/Black Library brand that I had read and got me started reading Warhammer novels. I will keep reading the Slayer series until the very day that Gotrek meets his epic doom.

A good addition to the Gotrek Series. No doubt about it. Nathan Long as a different way of writing G&F stories but they are great nevertheless. But unfortunally now he stopped writing and other books are being written that don't follow the straight line they were travelling so far.

In this book we start right after last one (Manslayer) with Gotrek morose because he couldn't arrive at the last battle in the Storm of Chaos Invasion. After meeting with some old friends (Max) they search for something that might destroy the Olde Worlde by a elven reliquary long thought to be lost.

In this book, Thanquol also appears and in this book they come face to face, which never happened before. Right until now, they had battle Skaven but never learn of the Grey Seer. This was done in such a way that I laugh. So much energy, years, power and Gotrek and Felix never even heard of Thanquol.

Here they battle dark elves, pirates, skaven and even sharks. I really enjoy the last battle as Gotrek battles a Great Daemon of Slaanesh and when he says that Gotrek is meant to someone higher than it. What are they talking about??? What is greater than a Daemon Prince? A God? Which God? It's unfortunate that Long stopped writing, and we bet we won't be seeing the end until the "cow" stop making money.

I don't know what it is about Nathan Long and his Gotrek & Felix novels, but for some reason they often come across as a child playing dress-up rather than a fully fledged novel.

In this tome we see Felix trying to help out his father in a bid to win his affection, but he quickly gets sidetracked when Max returns to their lives with a prophetess who has foreseen Gotrek's doom far away. There's also (as you might guess) an elf involved. We get everything from sea dragons to an almost sex scene, a whirlpool that drags everyone into a hidden world, and druchii fun time.

All of this SOUNDS interesting on paper, and Long can usually write an engaging tale, but through the whole thing it just felt like he was a kid excitedly scribbling on paper. 'And then THIS attacks!' I get that

there's a fair amount of that to any WHF novel, but here it just felt ... pointless, I guess. I'm really frustrated because Max WAS my favorite character in the G&F series. I've been waiting for his return for friggin' ever, and once he returns, there's a little bit of good bickering over Ulrika, but that's basically it for Max in this book.

I really liked the last one (Manslayer?), so I'll keep trying these, and I'm REALLY interested to read Long's Ulrika books, since he really seems to enjoy writing her & ... "gets" her more than maybe G&F. Here's hoping.

This time Gotrek and Felix find themselves facing off a horde of Dark Elves when they agree to go on a quest with Max, an Elven scholar and a Seer who has her eye fixed on Felix much to his and Max's displeasure.

As it seems to be the case with Long that is not at all how the story starts, in any case at the heart of the story is an ancient and very dangerous Elven weapon that must be either destroyed or put somewhere where it cannot be found (I won't disclose what ends up happening). There is also a side story involving Felix and his father.

As it was hinted in Manslayer, the Grey Seer Skaven makes a re-appearance in this book and is determined to kidnap and use Felix and Gotrek for his own purposes, by this point he has far outlasted most Skaven at almost 60 years old.

We get to see the dark elves and how they live and treat others, as well as get a closer look at dwarves and their sense of honour, which is tested but manages to come back and stand firm much to the Slayers pleasure.

A fluid read with a lot packed in for such a small book, while I am enjoying the series I can't help but wonder who will kill the Slayer? Such a creature/spirit/whatever will have the power to destroy everything

and everyone else...unless it is so wounded by its battle with the Slayer that Felix is able to finish it off thus giving the Slayer his doom at the same time killing off such a formidable creature and leaving Felix to write his book (after all we do have snippets from "my travels with Gotrek" in the books...unless that's Otto's doing...).
