My students found this text convoluted and cumbersome to read, but that may say more about their skills than about the book itself as their academic backgrounds are weak, by and large. I'm not sure I would have organized the chapter sections the same way they did -- I wasn't crazy about the way they broke up the "Therapeutic Content" sections, although I see the benefit. Overall, though, I think this is a good text for students. As a teacher, I found it helpful to supplement the text with other texts but that would probably be the case no matter which text I assigned.
