As many of my Goodreads friends know, I am a card-carrying Meredith Duran stan. The highlighter feature on my e-reader gets a good workout whenever I read one of her books. Of this particular collection, I read her novella and Sabrina Jeffries'. I'm familiar with Jeffries and own a couple of her books but have never read her stuff before. I might come back to the other stories closer to the holidays.

The Heiress and the Hothead - Sabrina Jeffries

I think I might have enjoyed this a bit more if I were more familiar with the author's current series. It was clear that the folks in this novella belonged to an existing fictional world. That said, it was a fun and cute little read and it incorporated a lot of facts about the harsh lives of mill workers into the story without getting boring or becoming terribly preachy. It was a little saccharine for my tastes at the end, but sort of in the vein of Love Actually, so it wasn't cringe-worthy or anything like that.

Sweetest Regret - Meredith Duran

The title of this story in the book doesn't match the one given here on Goodreads, Netgalley, or the publisher's description on ibooks. Hopefully this gets fixed before publication!

Of the two Duran novellas I've read, this is definitely the best and I enjoyed it a lot. She's got such a talent for description and dialogue that is intelligent and period-appropriate, yet still quite natural. Her stories never read like a contemporary novel that's been transplanted to the 19th century and that is quite a rare thing, I've found. I'm never jolted out of one of her stories by something that seems or is anachronistic.

I'm usually not a fan of HRs that center on a big misunderstanding, as this one does, but given the compressed space I'll give Duran a pass since this was a lovely, romantic story about second chances and forgiveness (of ourselves and others!). It captured the holiday spirit without becoming too sappy or sentimental. I'd love for Duran to one day write a really sprawling epic though. I'm greedy that way!

What Happens Under the Mistletoe is definitely a must-read if you're in the mood for a good and quick holiday read. All of the novellas in this anthology are well-written, nicely paced and pleasantly executed. There were some that shined more than others, but all of them were really very enjoyable.

(I guess it goes without saying that I have different parameters for judging novellas than a full-length novel. I'm more lenient to the lack of character development, and the lack of proper build-up in the romance. If you're bothered by these, or if these are your pet peeves, then maybe anthologies are not for you.)

THE HEIRESS AND THE HOTHEAD (SABRINA JEFFRIES): 3.5 STARS

Fans of Sabrina Jeffries who have read her *Sinful Suitor* series will be delighted to witness Lord Stephen finally meeting his match in the form of Amanda Keane, an American heiress. She's also the sister of Jeremy, the hero from book one. (Don't worry, though; you don't need to read the other books to enjoy this novella.)

I loved Amanda. She was strong and fearless without being bitchy and insensitive. And while I never really fell for Stephen—he was too stubborn and narrow-minded for me—I've come to appreciate him by the end of the story. Their arguments were very amusing, and I particularly liked seeing Amanda give Stephen the setdown he deserved.

The sexual tension was obvious from the start. But I do have one complain, though: The climax and subsequent resolution was a bit ridiculous for me. I think that the dramatic and over-the-top devices should be better saved for a full-length novel, where there is more space for its proper execution. But in any case, this was a really enjoyable read. It made me want to read more from the series, and I can't wait for the next *Sinful Suitor* book.

TWELVE KISSES TO MIDNIGHT (KAREN HAWKINS): 3 STARS

This was a novella about second chances. We have Marcus and Kenna who were drawn by fate to meet again after a devastating break-up several years ago.

As a big Karen Hawkins fan, I have to admit, I was really disappointed by this. I had a really difficult time liking the heroine and hero. To be honest, I never warmed up to Marcus (he was too pig-headed and immature), but I learned to respect Kenna by the end, especially when she actually grew a spine and fought for herself.

The angst was rather overplayed, though, and there were several times that I just wanted to bang their heads together and force them to JUST FUCKING TALK ABOUT IT LIKE ADULTS. Sigh.

The silver lining here was actually Tata Natasha, the grandmother of Marcus' best friend. She was so damn funny and amusing that she singlehandedly elevated this from a 2-star to a 3-star rating. I'm definitely going to read the writer's *The Oxenburg Princes* series after this.

BY ANY OTHER NAME (CANDACE CAMP): 5 STARS

Oh, damn. This was priceless. Amazing.

This was just perfect for me.

Mind you, I had reservations about this writer. The last book I read from her was *Enraptured*, and I did not

particularly enjoy that. So when I realised that this novella was actually part of that series (Secrets of the Loch), I had second thoughts. But wow. I'm really happy I read this.

Gosh, I can't even tell you how much I laughed while reading this. Gregory was so funny and adorable, especially when he was obsessing over finding Rylla's true identity. (Rylla never gave him her real name, so our hero here had to go through so much trouble to be with her.)

He made me melt. Big time.

“You do not find me scandalous? Shameful?”

He reached out and took her hand, lifting it to his lips to kiss each finger. “I find you utterly beguiling.”

SWEETEST REGRET (MEREDITH DURAN): 4 STARS

This is another novella about second chances. The hero and heroine were too snarky at each other at first—so much so that I had to question if they were truly in love in the first place. But as the chapters dragged on, I got to understand them and the circumstances that led to their current situation.

I got to give it to Meredith Duran. She writes really well. I could really sense Georgie's longing through her words, and the sexual tension was really palpable.

But in her dreams, she had tasted his tongue. She had felt the hard planes of his belly, the brawn of his thighs. He had lain with her in dreams countless times by now—but never vividly enough to satisfy her.

And Lucas' confession, later? Wow. That was powerful. I totally had *Casablanca* feels over it, man.

“It was love, in Munich.”

Lucas and Georgie were not perfect characters, and I'm okay with that. I think they had their own reasons, and that they were justified in their actions.

Overall, this anthology is highly recommended. It's by far one of the most enjoyable set of novellas I've read this year.

Series: Sinful Suitors (Book 1.5)

Stunned by the heat of an unexpected kiss on a cold winter's eve, two strangers from vastly different worlds turn hotheaded principles into burning passion.

I loved this story. Having read The Art of Sinning, the first book in the Sinful Suitors series, I was intrigued by Jeremy's sister Amanda. She is an independent woman who owns and runs the family mills in America. One reason for being in England is to find out why their mills are so much more profitable. There she encounters Lord Stephen Corry, younger brother of a marquess, who has made a career of investigating and writing about the terrible conditions of English mills. Their first meeting is quite fiery, as he kisses her under the mistletoe, believing her to be someone else. Stephen had hoped to interview Amanda, but their initial encounter has put them at odds. Still, he won't give up and strikes a bargain with her, where they can both get what they want. Neither had expected the sparks that flew between them.

I really enjoyed the unusual aspect of the story. Both Amanda and Stephen have similar goals, but approach them in different ways. Stephen is focused on exposing the worst and forcing change that way. Amanda looks at the way things are done and tries to figure out how to make them better at her own mills. I loved her strength of will and determination. Stephen was a little harder to like because of his stubbornness and tunnel vision when it came to mill owners, but he grew on me by the end.

I liked the development of their relationship as they worked together on his investigation of the local mill. I really enjoyed seeing Amanda shut Stephen down on some of his deepest prejudices. The more time they spent together the more he realized that he could be himself with her. Amanda saw that Stephen was a man who accepted her for who she was. The heat between them was fierce the closer they got. Neither of them could see a way to bring their different worlds together until a near tragedy opened their eyes to possibilities. The scene in the mill was rather improbable, but the ending was quite romantic.

A good second chance story. Marcus and Kenna had been engaged years before, but ended the engagement a month before the wedding. Kenna then married another man, but became a widow a few months before the story begins. Marcus isn't too happy to see Kenna at the same house party, as it brings back memories of what they had. That night he kisses her under the mistletoe, thinking that she is someone else. Unfortunately they are discovered, creating a scandal that Kenna does not need at this point in her life.

Marcus has spent the last few years in the diplomatic service, and is currently back in Scotland. Seeing Kenna again brings back the memories of what they had, and though he won't admit it, he has never forgotten her. He's got too much pride to let anyone see that he is still affected by the sight of her, and instead treats her with disdain. Then that kiss explodes between them. Though he won't admit it, he feels partly responsible. When he discovers she plans to ride over to her father's home and ask for his help, his protectiveness kicks in and he tries to stop her.

Kenna was heartbroken by the end of their engagement, and gave in to her father's pressure to marry someone else when it was over. Now that she's a widow, he is pressuring her once again to marry the man of his choice, and she only wants to live her life. The scandal created by Marcus's kiss causes her to ride to her father's to ask for his help in squashing it, even though she knows that there will be consequences. Marcus's attempts to stop her only increase her determination..

Riding off into a pending snowstorm isn't the smartest move, but Kenna's stubbornness won't allow her to admit that Marcus is right. Fortunately, he follows her, and they end up stranded in a cottage together. Forced together they finally have the chance to confront their pasts and see that both had made mistakes. Their conversations were helped along by the rather unique decorating in the cottage, as their similar sense of fun and the ridiculous bring them closer together.

The ending was good as they discover that their time together was extended by the machinations of Tata Natasha. Kenna's father and hopeful fiance arrive and try to force their will on Kenna, but she has finally gained the maturity to stand up to them both. There is also an interesting twist involving the rejected suitor that is the final nail in his coffin. I really enjoyed Tata Natasha's blunt observations about the people around her.

Series: Secrets of the Loch (Book 2.5)

Fun story. Rylla is distraught over the argument between her brother and father that sent her brother running from his family. After several days of not hearing from him, she is worried that something has happened to him, and is determined to search for him herself. To that end, she disguises herself in boy's clothing and heads out to the gambling dens to look for him.

Gregory is there keeping an eye on his cousin Andrew (brother to Isabel of Treasured), who is not known for his good luck in gambling. While there, he spots a young man who he suspects is going to be the next victim of the men he is playing cards with. When he leaves, Gregory spots a tail and follows just in time to rescue him from a robber. Taking the boy back to his rooms, he's stunned to discover a woman underneath the boy's clothing. He's also quite drawn to her.

This begins a period of cat and mouse, as Rylla is determined to protect herself from scandal by not telling him who she is. Gregory is equally determined to find her. Her attempts to mislead him cause some pretty funny moments, as he initially pursues the wrong woman. Once he discovers her true identity, he agrees to help her find her brother. Rylla is determined to be involved in the search, and her arguments are quite persuasive. It doesn't hurt that Gregory will take any excuse to spend time with her. The chemistry between them is very strong, and Gregory has a hard time trying to behave honorably. Rylla doesn't help, as she is determined to explore her feelings for him. I enjoyed seeing how everything worked out for them.

There was also a secondary romance between Andrew and Rylla's friend Eleanor. The sparks between them were also fun, as Andrew is the irresponsible gambler and Eleanor the daughter of a minister and a woman with decidedly different values. I loved their interactions and the effect they had on each other. Andrew's actions at the end were awkward and sweet and pretty funny.

Sweetest Regret by Meredith Duran

Terrific second chance story. Georgie is the daughter of a British diplomat who rushes off a few days before Christmas to deal with a crisis, leaving her to entertain a houseful of foreign guests. To top it all off, he tells her that one of them may have stolen an important letter, and charges her with finding it before they leave. To help her with that task, he has sent for one of his underlings - the very man who broke her heart two years earlier.

Lucas was on his way to England anyway because of a family issue. Stopping in to help Georgie isn't high on his list of pleasant activities after the way she had treated him two years earlier. He'll do what he must and be on his way, making sure that she doesn't get another shot at his heart.

First, I have to say that I disliked Georgie's father from the very beginning. His attitude toward her was very condescending, as though she couldn't really be trusted to manage on her own. The more I learned about him during the story, the less I liked him.

The early encounters between Georgie and Lucas were very contentious. Each of them blames the other for

what had happened in Munich, and the verbal arrows fly fast and furious. As each one looks back to those days, they can't understand why the other behaves as if they are the injured party. When they really let go with their tempers, suddenly they realize that their stories do not match. Actually talking to each other about what happened, they discover that they had been parted by the machinations of Georgie's father.

I felt really bad for Lucas, who had suffered all his life because of who his parents were. Because of that, he was a little too quick to believe the lies that Georgie's father told him, and his pride wouldn't let him contact Georgie to convince her. Georgie has her own insecurities, considering herself rather plain and boring. She certainly didn't think that she was enough to keep the interest of a handsome and charming man like Lucas.

Once they straightened out the truth about the past, it didn't take long for them to make up for lost time. I loved seeing them work together to find the missing letter, while entertaining the crowd of foreign diplomats. I loved their determination to be together now, though Georgie worries about the havoc that her father could cause to Lucas's career.

When Georgie's father returns, he admits to his interference both then and now, claiming he only wanted what was best for her. But Georgie is wise to him now, and displays her own form of making her point. I loved seeing her stand up to her father and his antics. It is even more satisfying when Lucas returns from his family business with his own plans for their future.

I read this one for the Meredith Duran story, but ended up loving all of the stories!

The Heiress and the Hothead by Sabrina Jeffries -3 stars

This was my least favorite, but only because of a couple things. The hero has been reporting on the substandard work conditions in the mills. He's riled some people, but being a second son, his brother wants him to be more respectable. So when he is invited to stay through Christmas with friends and family, he isn't thrilled. But the American mill owner and heiress he's been wanting to expose for being just as bad as the local ones will be there. So he can't say no.

But she's not that bad. And she's beautiful, and kind, and makes his man bits tingle ;)

I was really into it, until at one point the mill is on fire, and they're trapped, so of course, she's all "Take me I'm yours!" I mean, seriously. A raging inferno is tearing through a cotton mill, and both know those kind of fires rage out of control. But, you know, priorities.

Twelve Kisses by Karen Hawkins-5 stars

I think this ended up being my favorite. A proud Highlander, and his former fiancee get caught in a blizzard, and at one point the heroine actually draws a line down the middle of the cottage pronouncing one side hers, and the other his.

The best part about this story is that the heroine is willing to admit that they were young, and they both were wrong. There's no real Big Misunderstanding. It really is just anger, hurt, and pride keeping them from being together. I loved it, and I loved the ending.

By Any Other Name by Candace Camp-4 stars

But he also has his subordinate Lucas coming in to help. The problem is that Lucas and Georgie have a past. And her father knows this.

Can they find who took the documents without tearing each other apart? Or will being stuck together dredge up their past?

Every year a slew of holiday anthologies hit the market ranging from syrupy heartwarming tales to silly and funny capers, all centered around the most anticipated holiday of the season. But, few of these compilations have a star studded group of seasoned authors gathered in one place, like this one does.

If you are a fan of regency period historical romance, then you will recognize these authors and you know you can count on them, which, for me is a huge selling point, mainly because I know there will be no weak entries, and each story is one of high quality and authenticity.

Sabrina Jeffries kicks the party off with a unique tale involving the dangers of mill workers and the horrible practice of hiring underage staff and subjecting them to long hours, little pay, and dangerous work conditions.

Amanda is from America, an heiress, running a successful mill, but has traveled to England to see why their businesses are more profitable. She encounters Stephen, a man on a mission, to report on the unsafe environment of mills. He lumps Amanda in with the worst of the lot, sparking a challenge between them, and a little chemistry too. Can Amanda prove she's not all the other mill owners? Can she calm Stephen's hot temper and join forces with him to make positive changes? Maybe- with a little help from the Christmas spirit, a sly kiss under the mistletoe and a little soul searching.

I liked this story because it featured an American, a dedicated business woman, and a little action and

adventure, plus it had a depth to it, something that many regency stories seem to lack these days.

The second, and the lengthiest story is "Twelve Kisses to Midnight" by Karen Hawkins and the third story is "By Any Other Name" by Candace Camp. Both stories are solid offerings, with Ms. Hawkins being the most prominent story included in the anthology.

Closing the book is Meredith Duran's "Sweetest Regret". This story has a touch of intrigue, which is always fun, but the story title suggested some regret is involved, and indeed a young couple in love were driven apart, losing two years together as a result. However, this delightful second chance love story, ends with the couple finally making up for all that lost time. There is some cute banter in this one and I really loved the ending.

Overall, this Christmas anthology is one of the best I've read this year. You really can't go wrong with the group of talented authors gathered in one place.

A holiday anthology with four well-known historical romance authors on offer. Why not?

I have never read books of Candace Camp and Meredith Duran before, though I heard of their names. Karen Hawkins however, was one of my favorite historical romance authors and I've read a couple of Sabrina Jeffries series. And nothing could go wrong with holiday stories, right?

Well, this time and especially for me, that assumption is proven right.

What Happens Under the Mistletoe is a collection of entertaining holidays tale set in regency era England and Scotland. Overall it was all fun to read, had quite a few laugh and outrage moments as wont to happen when I got immersed in the stories.

To recap, here are my thoughts on each individual tale.

The Heiress and The Hothead by Sabrina Jeffries - 3.5 stars

This novella is part of the "Sinful Suitors" series, stories surround the nobles of St. George's Club. Some of its members appearing here, but the book could be read as a standalone.

Younger sons were usually pictured as no good young lords who spent life wasting their non-existing fortunes. So it's refreshing for me that the hero, Lord Stephen Cory - youngest brother of Lord Knightford -

was way far from that detriment. He's a man of principle who had given up his prospect to be a journalist, and fight to better the mills workers life.

His *courtship*, for lack of a better word, with Ms. Amanda Keane, an American mill owner was rather rocky because of their distrust. Gradually, this supposed foes combined their wit and made that change.

Both MCs were headstrong and opinionated, but very likable. I also found other supporting characters here (the house party hosts, guests, and mill worker family) engaging.

What bugged me was one scene (view spoiler) The rationale of that action was a bit bewildering for me. Other than that though, it's a smooth sail for me.

Twelve Kisses to Midnight by Karen Hawkins 2.85 stars

The novella is tied in to "The Oxenburg Princes" Series and we meet again with the ever meddling, exasperating and witty Tata Natasha. She was not the main character though, neither any of her grandchildren. But the Crown Prince Nikolai was here as close friend of the hero, Duke of Rothesay Marcus Sutherland.

It was a second chance story, another of those misunderstanding over chafed pride that had resulted in misery on both sides. This holiday it was time to turn the thing around.

Admittedly, both characters were not to my liking. A pair of adult who sulked and threw hurtful words to each other. I found the story dragging.

The upside - besides Tata Natasha - was the last chapter where both Kenna and Marcus made the intelligent decision and SPOKE of it without delay. But to be honest, this is my least like story in the anthology.

By Any Other Name by Candace Camp - 2.85 stars

My first time with Ms. Camp is a fun holiday "catch me if you can" romp set in Edinburgh, Scotland. Miss Amaryllis "Rylla" Campbell posed as young lad and sneaked out at night to visit gambling hell to look for his brother. The unlikely hero was Mr. Gregory Rose, who saw Rylla on a card table nearby and flabbergasted by his reaction to the young lad.

I loved how Gregory chasing after Rylla, never knowing her name. Upon deduction, he figured his mysterious lady's name and dragooned his cousin, Lord Andrew Rose, into introducing him to her. But all in all, this was a nice intro to Ms. Camp's work. I think I might look for her other titles. Who knows.

The Sweetest Regret by Meredith Duran - 3.5 stars

Another first timer reading, and I found I like Ms. Duran style.

The story evolve around the household of Trent, one of British most cunning and sharp diplomat and his daughter Georgina. During his post in Munich, Georgie visited him and got close with his lowly subordinate, Lucas Godwin. Their courtship fell through with Lucas transferred to Paris and her went home to England.
