I do, however, have a problem with labeling the child with their behaviors. Child psychologists teach that you should be careful to tell a child that their behavior is bad, they are not bad. Children learn to believe what they're told by those they love and trust, and can grow to believe that they are a bad child.

Unfortunately, this simple story does not make that distinction.

I think it's important to read it to kids with their open, absorbent minds by changing the words as you read it from: *Sometimes you're good, sometimes you're bad.* to: *Sometimes you do things that are good, sometimes you do things that are bad.*

Otherwise, a lovely book.
