*The List* is an emotionally raw, moving story about two people trying to figure out how to be together. It's tough to read at times. But it's absolutely worth reading.

The characters are Tilda, who owns an upscale stationery store, and Daniel, an FBI agent. Seemingly, they have little in common, but they do have an instant attraction.

Tilda also has a way with people, in that she makes connections for others. She provides people with introductions to each other. She's a matchmaker. Funny thing is, while she has an uncanny sense for what brings others together, she tends to hold people in her own life at a distance.

The relationship between Tilda and Daniel moves very quickly. It's not a spoiler to say that they marry only six months after first meeting. So it's interesting when Tilda agrees to marry Daniel so quickly, since she tends not to have serious relationships. The majority of the story is the two of them working out their relationship, especially how little they know about each other at the start.

Tilda is blunt and straightforward, but she's also a woman of secrets. Initially, she comes across as rather cold and distant toward Daniel. In fact, I disliked her character for the majority of the book. It isn't until her big secret is revealed that I finally gained some understanding as to why she carries herself the way that she does. After seeing what shaped her life and made her who she is, I understood her better and felt more sympathetic toward her.

Daniel is a strong, stable character. I feel that the story is skewed more toward Tilda, especially since she has so many secrets that Daniel is trying to puzzle out. It's like we're trying to figure her out along with him.

There's a constant underlying melancholy that runs throughout the story. At the beginning, we know that they're married but for some reason, Tilda wants a divorce. As the story unfolds, we discover the subtleties to their relationship as well as how they've arrived at this impasse, where Tilda is ready to give up on the marriage.

Anne Calhoun's writing is so precise and emotive here. I'm a huge fan of hers because she is always adept at conveying the intensity and complexity of human emotions.

The tone of the book, especially the ending, is unabashedly romantic. Even though I struggled at times wanting to connect with Tilda and not doing so until the end, the relationship between her and Daniel is so meaningful that I can't recommend this book highly enough.

Immediately, upon meeting Daniel, I fell in love. He's a man's man who loves with all his heart and wears it on his sleeve. In the interest of full disclosure I will say that I'm a longtime fan and supporter of Anne Calhoun. Regardless, not once did she let me down with her stories. Over the years, her writing has become richer, more detailed and refined. Every time I read one of her books, especially those she released in the last couple years, I say to myself that she is the author who *takes me apart and she finds the rhythm that draws me under, the angle that layers pleasure until I can't breathe under the weight.*

The graze of nails, fingertips trailing over aroused skin  
The scratch of a five o'clock shadow  
Rain pattering at a steady rhythm against windows  
Leaves rustling on the concrete  
A picturesque landscape surrounded by cliffs and the sea  
The energy, the thrilling life pulsing through a big city  
It's all palpable and brought to life  
In the most sublime way through  
Anne's distinct writing

Whenever I'm done with one of her stories, I can't wait to open the first page of her next book. It's addictive and I'm never getting tired of her writing because, even after so many years and a myriad of sex and love scenes, she manages to keep my interest through her sensual writing that never ceases to amaze me. The List is erotic romance with depth and Anne Calhoun is easily my favorite erotic romance author. Anne, don't ever stop writing because it's sometimes true...it's a *lifetime job*.

Before you start reading this book, I'd recommend you to check out the acknowledgments and especially the dedication. Says all.

The List starts off at a summer solstice, present time, with Daniel and Tilda (view spoiler) in the pulsating town of New York. It's been exactly one year since Daniel met Tilda. One chapter later, the reader is starting to looking back at *The Year of Tilda*.

*Attention is the most basic form of love. (...)*

I thought the time gap (it was only one year) was done well because it's definitely not just a simple and very long flashback. The storyline and main leads were fully fleshed out and the engaging plot switched back to present time at the 75% mark.

Daniel Logan works white-collar crime with the FBI and Matilda (Tilda) Davies, a British expat, owns a high-end stationery shop and enjoys playing matchmaker as a spare-time job. Tilda is sitting on a ledge two hundred feet over Park Avenue South when she meets the future man of her life at a friend's home. They have an interesting chat and then a few days later Tilda receives a dinner invitation from Daniel. Tilda declines but Daniel feels challenged and since he's the tenacious kind of guy...

...he succeeds...

***"The old-fashioned method of asking you out didn't work. I took a different track."***

### **Daniel**

He's a very smart and wonderful gentleman who hardly ever swears and who falls head over heels for aloof and somewhat enigmatic Tilda Davies. His job requires an analytical mind which comes in quite handy when he tries to unravel Tilda. Some other qualities of Daniel are being a good listener, being patient and persistent. And, as a nice bonus, he's a marathon runner and his long wind is needed while dealing with complicated Tilda. Though his very best features are his hands and his mouth. Commanding the language of dirty talk, he does A-mazing things with both, hands and mouth. Daniel is the man who *gathers sunlight, carries it with him and stores it up for dark days.*

On behalf of Daniel I've written a letter to Tilda:

Feel the pulse pounding through your system  
A puff of damp air caresses your nape  
My fingers slide over your body to feel muscle and bone  
Your skin is a sensuous map  
I'll find you, unravel your mystery  
I'll fit the puzzle pieces because  
You can't run from us  
I'll take genuine over created any day  
I'll push you over the ledge  
And fly down fast to catch you

Show me your softer, more receptive side  
You can't deny it, I'll tease it out of you  
When you don't hover on the ledge  
Ready to use your sharp angles to distract  
When you're all serene and mentally bare  
Ready to reveal your vulnerable side  
That's where I'll understand you  
Even if it will take a lifetime of getting to know you  
You're irrevocably stuck with me  
Because...you're the *flesh of my flesh*  
*Blood inked on the paper of my bones*  
And *I'm not here because it's the right thing to do,*  
*I'm here because I love you*

***"Keep going," he said. "I need more data."***

*She lowered her gaze in an attitude that would have been demure and humble if her eyelashes hadn't flickered just so. "God," he said. "You're so hot. I'm right there."*

## **Tilda**

Tilda is an odd combination of guardedness, aloofness, strength and vulnerability. Friendly warning, I think that many readers will have a very hard time liking, let alone loving her. She's nothing like the (almost too) perfect Lacey.

*Life isn't black ink on white paper, columns and numbers and script. It's a work of art that integrates the past into the future.*

I took my time to watch Tilda and, somewhere along the way, I thought I really got her. Tilda is great connecting other people with each other and she knows what they need and how to handle them. But her own desires and feelings is a different matter altogether. The need to claim what she really wants and deserves, the yearning for love and belonging, all that is a rather foreign concept for her to grasp and, ultimately, to implement in her life. Her professional life is a perfect creation and, in a way, reflects what she's not capable to do with her personal life. It's a flawless story but, somewhere underneath it all, there's the real Tilda. Hiding.

*"I don't know what they find," Tilda said finally. "I facilitate connection, a way to reach out to another person as best they can. Perhaps the permanence is in sustaining the beauty of that moment, the tangible elegance of it all. It fades away, of course. But they've had that moment. Can we really hope for more?"*

Frankly, I expected her secret to be...shocking but it wasn't. I really appreciated that (view spoiler)

"I don't want sex. I just want to be close to you."

Due to her uprooted childhood and her loveless and resenting mother, I was aware that Tilda would have issues. On the other hand, I thought that her lovely Nan made up for (almost) everything; she showered Tilda with love and understanding. (view spoiler) Enter Daniel. Sex was easy, not bound by risks yet (view spoiler)

"Everything we've done and been is scraped over, melted down, but remains a part of what we become."

Anne has mastered the direct, quick and super hot approach of a sexual encounter in the past but what I especially appreciate about her writing *now* is that incredibly intimate voice that coalesces into exquisite



finesse and that's something that's seeping through her writing more and more. It's so good; you can feel, smell, see and hear everything her characters are saying and experiencing. The final 20 % of The List were emotionally-charged and terribly beautiful. In addition to the main leads, the story provides a really good and interesting cast of secondary characters.

Bottom line, The List is a must read for every fan of Anne Calhoun and those readers who enjoy their erotic romance stories spiced up with depth and that certain something should check it out too.

Anne Calhoun gives us a more serious and somber erotic story of two people working their way through the first year of their relationship. From meeting, to having sex, to marriage and then divorce, Daniel and Tilda have quite the journey this first year. Daniel is a FBI agent in NYC who investigates white-collar crime. He meets Tilda one night at a mutual friend's house. Tilda is from England but attended NYU and made New York city her home. She owns a very high-end stationery shop in the west village and the shop is just like her – all sleek lines and very classy. Just for fun, Tilda also plays matchmaker to friends and friends of friends. Finding a hand-written note very intimate and something that most people are missing out of their lives, she makes her intended couples write letters and matches them this way. This part of Tilda doesn't play a huge part in the story, but it does play a big role into the type of person Tilda is as an adult.

*Couture stationary was her labor of love, but connecting people with unusual desires was her passion, her specialty. Given enough time, she managed to match most people who ended up on her list.*

The first time Daniel sees Tilda, he wants her. He asks her to dinner, but she declines. Later, out of the blue, she starts to receive very interesting texts from Daniel, and she can only assume he is “sexting” her by mistake.

*I want to go down on you.*

And then:

*Correction: I want to tie you to the bed and go down on you until you can't talk.*

There are many more. Oh Daniel.

Tilda decides to run over to his office to let him know he is texting the wrong person – but Daniel has Tilda figured out. Or so he thinks. He knows from their first meeting that she craves a little danger and wildness. Tilda is a woman who is extremely in control and rigid, yet has a tightly bundled coil of energy and wild

behavior deep inside her. He knows she would not be able to resist these dirty texts – and he was right.

They start having sex (dirty, intense sex) from then on. Six months later they marry, six months later, Tilda asks for a divorce (you learn this all in the first chapter of the book, and then we go back one year to the beginning). What happens during that year which leads from passionate sex to a divorce – that is the book, and that is what you will have to discover.

It's a more serious, somber book. Daniel is all warmth and kindness. Tilda is kind too – but she is a cool breeze. They both are very dedicated to work and work long hours. Tilda's stationary company is in talks to go global, and this deal takes up a lot of her time. Tilda comes from a high-powered career mother who sent her off to boarding school, where Daniel comes from a more traditional close-knit family. These backgrounds start to clash a bit as their relationship progresses.

What kept me totally engaged in this story is Tilda. I think some readers out there are going to call her too cold for their tastes. And I completely understand why. She is cold. She has this intense, rigid side to her. I'm not sure she ever spontaneously bursts into laughter in this book. But, I felt the chemistry between her and Daniel. She does push him away because deep down she has low self-esteem and a very vulnerable side that she tries so hard to hide. But she intrigued me. As Daniel peels back each layer of her, the more interested I became.

Tilda didn't jump into this marriage with gleeful open arms. I believe she loved Daniel, but I think she sees marriage as more of a cage. I never felt like she wanted anyone but Daniel, but the idea of marriage, of being domestic is not something Tilda is familiar with. She doesn't sit around daydreaming of weddings and babies and the future. For her, it's feeling in the moment. It's pushing that boundary just a little to get a dangerous feel.

*"Marriage hasn't ruined you."*

*She sipped her wine and watched Daniel's conversation with the archaeologist, Daniel nodding and listening, the archaeologist gesturing expansively. "Pardon?"*

*"You've not transformed into a dull matron."*

*"I'm twenty-eight. Give me a few years and see what happens," she said, but even as she spoke, she couldn't imagine herself celebrating a five-year anniversary.*

Daniel's love for her is pretty simple honestly. He just plain loves her. Tilda challenges him and Daniel likes that excitement in his life. His family is so opposite of Tilda, they don't understand his attraction to her.

The problem was that sometimes the things that were best for you weren't the things that made you feel complete. When he was with Tilda, he felt whole.

*"I love her," Three words, single syllables. They should say everything he needed to say and yet to someone on the outside they were meaningless.*

*"I just don't see how she'll make you happy."*

*Maybe he didn't want to be made happy. Maybe he didn't want someone to slot him into the neat, orderly rows of How Things Are Done. Maybe he wanted someone who not only sat on ledges or slipped over cliffs,*

*but also dared him to go over with her.*

There is a bigger revelation at the end which explains some of Tilda's actions and reactions. I kind of expected this to have a bigger impact than it did – but at the same time, once this revelation comes to light, Tilda doesn't magically become a different person. But a weight is lifted off of her and other things happen and I believed in a happy ever after for her and Daniel.

On a side note I have to say, the descriptions of stationery in this book and Tilda's passion towards it comes across so well and rich in detail. I appreciated the detail the author put into making that a big part of the story.

*Quick & Dirty*: A woman who loves to take risks meets a man whose life is all about order in this erotic romance. While it had a promising beginning, my interest quickly declined as the book went on.

Opening Sentence: The window air-conditioning unit clicked twice, then whirred to life.

The Review:

The past year has been a whirlwind for Daniel and Tilda. In that timeframe, they met, fell in love, and got married. Now, they're on the verge of divorce. Daniel can't figure out what went wrong and why Tilda is now so set on ending things. The only thing he can think of is that he needs to go back over their time together and see if there are any clues pointing to what's really going on. He'll start from the moment they

met and continue through the whole year. Will he be able to find what he seeks? Will Tilda be able to let go of her past in order to ensure a future for herself and Daniel?

I thought the beginning of the book was promising. I liked how it started off at a counseling session, showing that all is not well in Daniel and Tilda's marriage. It served the purpose of immediately making me interested in finding out what happened to bring them to this point. Unfortunately, it all went downhill from there. I found myself reluctant to continue the book, only doing so because I needed to write a review. The last 10 percent of the book hooked me again, but it was too little too late.

As much as I liked the beginning, I think a big part of the problem was the pacing. Every chapter took place at a different point in time throughout the year. While it did go in order, it still felt really choppy, almost as if I was reading vignettes rather than something that was supposed to be a cohesive whole. This also served to make me feel really distant from the characters, Tilda especially. The majority of the book is from her point of view, but we don't really get to see what makes her tick until the last 10 to 15 percent of the book. The fact that the reader isn't clued in to Tilda's past until the last portion of the book really hurts the character development. We may have clues as to what happened to make her the way she is, but without really knowing, we can't feel connected to her. For most of the book, she just comes off as being very cold and unfeeling, only warming up when it comes to sex.

And there we come to another problem: often, it felt like there was a whole lot more sex than plot, which if you've read any of my reviews, you know that is an issue for me. I get bored quickly when reading sex scene after sex scene. I need something else to happen to keep me interested. That's not to say the scenes weren't well written; they were good and full of heat and chemistry, but I just got tired of them after a while.

All in all, while I did like the beginning and end of the book, the bulk of it left me bored. I'm guessing if you've read and enjoyed the previous books in the series, you'll probably like this one as well. It just unfortunately didn't end up being my cup of tea.

"After watching Angie get married, I have no interest in a big wedding."

"Neither do I," she said from the closet. She slid her arms into a long-sleeved wrap dress of garnet wool, tied the belt, then zipped up black leather boots. He snagged her on her way out the door to drop a kiss on her nape. The strength of his arm contrasted with the tender touch of his mouth sent a shiver down her spine.

"I'll meet you at the courthouse. You know where it is?"

"Yes," she said.

So she walked to the shop under a low, threatening gray sky, and worked. She helped customers, fielded email requests, sorted orders, talked to Edith about the upcoming show for Sheba. The day had an aura of unreality about it, humid air and a cold breeze that boded of a coming storm, mirroring the mix of secretive joy and utter terror inside her.

Tilda Davies is an old school type of girl that prefers the art of real communicating with paper and words and not with the modern day ways with social media, texting and emails. He starts with the old fashioned way but blows it, so he has to step up his game and appeal to her sensual side. Once the door is open, he jumps in with two feet. Tilda just wants passion because she has her own inner demons not allowing her to believe that she can have more.

After a whirlwind romance she does the unthinkable and marries Daniel but when her past comes to the forefront she tries to leave Daniel. Daniel knew what he was getting into but doesn't know how to make Tilda believe that he is in it for the long haul.

**"It's not sex, Tilda. I want to white out your thoughts, turn your muscles to jelly and your bones to light. I want to taste your come, my come, our sweat. It's annihilation. That's what I want to do to you."**

Trying to find a bridge into her psyche he starts to learn the reasons why she believes that their marriage is a mistake.

**"Tilda. There is a difference between I've made a mistake and I am a mistake, or I've done a bad thing and I am a bad thing. There is a difference between guilt and shame...."**

For Tilda her past choices in her mind defined her. She was just a girl wanting love but was taught the opposite.

**Tilda thought who she was made people abandon her.**

**They'd taught her, however inadvertently, to be ashamed of her need for love, and to doubt the motivations and tenacity of anyone who needed her in return. They'd taught her that the only thing she deserved was sex, not love. They'd taught her everyone belonged on her list except her.**

For Tilda she didn't think she deserved her own HEA and when it was close to the surface she reverted to her past ideals.

**" ... Wanting has never been my problem. My problem is having. Keeping what I want."**

**"That's not your problem, Tilda."**

Daniel had to find a way to just love her for her and convince her of it. That was the only way that they could find a sliver of any happiness together.

**Life isn't black ink on white paper, columns and numbers and script. It's a work of art that integrates the past into the future. ...**

I really did like this book especially the realness of downfall of this couple and their journey to make it out the other end together. It did take me a bit to get into but once I was immersed into the story I was hooked.
