This is more of a resource book than one to read straight through, and it only goes until Elder Maxwell's talks and quotes from 1997, but it's full of many great topics and quotes and real gems! :) Here are a few of my favorites:

"God does not begin by asking us about our ability, but only about our availability, and if we then prove our dependability, he will increase our capability (p. 1)."

"Church members do not become inactive while crossing the plains, when the sense of belonging and being needed was so profound (p. 3)."

"So much of our time is ironically devoted to learning and marketing perishable skills that will soon become obsolete. It isn't just the morticians who will have a vocational crisis in the next world (p. 36)."

"It makes sense to me that the Lord would choose out of the world those who are (or who could become) different from the world and, therefore, could lead the world to a different outcome. We must be different in order to make a difference (p. 43)."

"The Church is 'for the perfecting of the saints' (Ephesians 4:12); it is not a well-provisioned rest home for the already perfected...in the kingdom we are each other's clinical material; the Lord allows us to practice on each other, even in our imperfections (p. 46)."

"So often we feel, implicitly, that we are doing God a favor if we do his work, that we are helping him along when, in fact, our performance properly undertaken is for the welfare of our soul, not his! It is our happiness and our growth he seeks (p. 50)!"

"Suppose Peter had not left his nets 'straightway'? He might have become the respected president of the local Galilean fisherman's association. But he would not have been on the Mount of Transfiguration with Jesus, Moses, and Elias and heard the voice of God (p. 55)."

"It is very important that we not assume the perspectives of mortality in making the decisions that bear on eternity! We need the perspectives of the gospel to make decisions in the context of eternity. We need to understand we cannot do the Lord's work in the world's way (p. 76)."

"God knows even now what the future holds for each of us....The future 'you' is before him now. He knows what it is he wishes to bring to pass in your life. He knows the kind of remodeling in your life and in mine that he wishes to achieve (p. 80)."

"The adversary never uses any of his annual leave (p. 82)."

"We should learn from our errors, but then forget them as soon as we can (p. 106)."

"The acceptance of the reality that we are in the Lord's loving hands is only a recognition that we have never really been anywhere else (p. 113)."

"When the real history of mankind is fully disclosed, will it feature the echoes of gunfire or the shaping sound of lullabies? The great armistices made by military men or the peacemaking of women in homes and in neighborhoods? Will what happened in cradles and kitchens prove to be more controlling than what happened in congresses? When the surf of the centuries has made the great pyramids so much sand, the everlasting family will still be standing, because it is a celestial institution, formed outside telestial time (p. 116)."

"Involve newcomers quickly in the Lord's work. They have been called to his vineyard not just to admire but to perspire--not to 'ooh' and 'aah' but to 'hoe and saw.' Let us make of them friends--not celebrities; colleagues--not competitors. Let us use their precious enthusiasm to beckon still others to come within (p. 124)."

"May we be different in order to make a difference in the world (p. 143)."

"The gospel requires us to yield our minds as well as bend our knees. Minds are often more arthritic than knees (p. 165)."

"Humility is not the disavowal of our worth; rather, it is the sober realization of how much we are valued by

God. Nor does true humility call for the denigration of what truth we already know; rather, it is the catching of one's breath, as he realizes how very little that which we mortals presently know really is (p. 165)!"

"Too often we behave as if we were in massive competition with others for God's love. But we have His love; it is our love of Him that remains to be proven, such as through service to others (p. 204)."

"God trusts women so much that He lets them bear and care for His spirit children (p. 218)."

"Significantly, those who look forward to a next and better world are usually 'anxiously engaged' in improving this one, for they 'always abound in good works (p. 265).'"

"In the economy of heaven, God does not send thunder if a still, small voice is enough, or a prophet if a priest can do the job (p. 288)."

"Temple work is not an escape from the world but a reinforcing of our need to better the world while preparing ourselves for another and far better world. Thus, being in the Lord's house can help us to be different from the world in order to make more difference in the world (p. 339)."

"It is only by yielding to God that we can begin to realize His will for us. And if we truly trust God, why not yield to His loving omniscience? After all, He knows us and our possibilities much better than do we (p. 350)."

"The only way to avoid being overcome by the cares of the world...is to stop caring so much for the world (p. 366)."

I wrote down the sources of all my favorite quotes. The quotes I liked best came from 18 different Ensign articles, 7 BYU Devotional speeches and 21 different books. I would like to try and read all the articles and speeches to see the original context where the quotes were taken from. I doubt I'll get around to reading all 21 books. Maybe I'll just add some of the book titles to my long list of books-to-read.

I do love Elder Maxwell. The pictures in the book were nice. The idea to sort the quotes out by theme was a good organizational idea. I think I would like this book better if they cut out the lengthy quotes and condensed the quotes down into a smaller, more affordable book.
