I've known Amber for a few years through the writing community; I'm a faithful fan of hers, and when she mentioned FINALLY publishing a book, my expectations were high. She did not disappoint.

Where We Fell is a story about a boy named Oliver, who's diagnosed with cancer, and the girl he meets, Hannah. Without giving too much away, this is not your typical "boy meets girl and falls in love" love story. Perfectly paced and wonderfully written, within its short eighty-something pages, you take a ride through a variety of emotions: sadness, hope, despair, lust, happiness, disappointment, and relief.

I have to admit I didn't really buy this book because I wanted to read it. I did because I wanted to support an indie author who is friends with me on Facebook. Basically. The book went straight to my TBR list on my kindle, which is actually a kind of pit for books I'm not really eager to read.

But then I happened to run out of reading stuff during a train ride, with still an hour to go, so I thought, "What the hell..."

I didn't even remember the summary that I must have read at some time, so I had no idea what this book was even about.

But I was inside the main character's mind immediately, the experience sudden and bittersweet and gripping. And I cursed when my train ride came to an end, because I really, really didn't want the amazing journey I was making in my head to stop.

The story is a quick read though, and I finished it the same day, right after I came home. I'm not giving spoilers, but after revisiting the summary I feel I have to say that the ending is not bad, like the whole story is not angst-ridden, despite of the mentioned "diagnosis".

Instead, it is just deeply human.

Oliver's POV shows you what it feels like when life is taking you on a sudden, bumpy, not-so-funny ride without a stop to get off... when you just have to go with it, and you do, while the drama is happening around you, but somehow not inside you, because... well, you just have no choice.

It also shows you that often the deepest and greatest love doesn't need words. It's not the "I love you" that makes a difference, it's being there. It's a person to be yourself with, it's a place to go to, it's an honest smile meant for you.

This book bristles with exactly that... you feel the author's honesty, love and her will to give a huge part of herself. It's a book that says, "Life, I love you!", without actually using those words. But it spoke to me, not loudly but intensely, and it seriously made my day.

Where we fell begins when Oliver, a teenager who is about to go to college, is diagnosed with cancer.

So the blurb says this : *One decision to visit his favorite diner causes him to unwittingly put himself directly in the sights of a girl that just may give him a reason to fight - and to live.*

That's where I don't agree : *Where we fell* isn't the story of a boy who **fight** cancer. No. *Where we fell* is an instalove romance story where the main character appears to have cancer.

See the difference?

Basically that story was too blank. Yes, blank, and I'm weighing my words here. I mean, to switch in a romance? That's okay, I guess. **If** the romance is heart-warming. **It wasn't**. First I didn't get the connection between the characters - yes, *I know*, Hannah spills coffee on Oliver and decides to buy him a pie. *Okaaaay*. And then? **There isn't a single fact which can explain why she's interested in him**. Except the fact he has cancer. Yes, except *that* fact. And that sucks. As for Oliver, well, his interest in Hannah is easier to understand : she has boobs. But I'll come back to that later.

You know when you're not involved in a love story? **When the character says *I love you*, you roll your eyes**. Yep. I'm still shocked by my reaction.

Unfortunately **I found the plot really, really light**. I know I have a novella in my hands, but still that's not an excuse, you know why? Because I just read another novella from Amber L. Johnson, *Puddle Jumping*, which was **incredible**. Wonderful.

So, the plot. In my opinion the story lacks of descriptions of the *fight* Oliver is supposed to handle - with the exceptions of a few details, we're never really aware he has a cancer. Oh, he **tells** us it, but unfortunately telling is rarely the best way to express feelings. I wanted to be moved, I was willing to give him tears - it never happened. **Never**.

But **my main issue is Oliver himself**. Oh, dude. I'm a little embarrassed because *come on*, I'm going to rant about a character who has cancer. That makes me cold-hearted right? Ugh. The truth is, I spent the major part of the story **without knowing who Oliver is**, and the story is told in his POV, dammit! There's a moment Hannah says him she doesn't know him, and I was like, *oh.my.god*, you too?

I found myself waiting, and waiting, and waiting to learn who he is and you know what? When **finally** I got a glimpse of his personality, I didn't like him. I mean, hey, we have a real teenager here!
