Being a comic enthusiast I was intrigued with Bergen delving into this new realm of storytelling and how he would make it his own. Bergen always finds a way to incorporate the traditional and turn it into something fresh and unique. At first, reading through issues 1-3, I was a bit skeptical of his image stylization but as I continued, the imagery choice became clear. Heropa being a digital program, (think Matrix), you see things that are familiar yet confusing and mashed up. Heropa is literally compiled up of a montage/collage of comics, detective noir films, and sci-fi, that of Bradbury or Chandler. While paying homage to many of his

favorites, Bergen very well leaves his fingerprint on this piece of work. Bergen's artistic approach will definitely leave an impression and as for his writing, I can't seem to get enough.
