Peter, Beth's husband, who loves his late mother way too much, he, gets insecure and vulnerable when he learns the fact that his father has fallen in love with a woman in Spain after all these years. Charlie, an old lonely woman, was left heart-broken many years ago, so never welcomed love in her life ever again, but now love has come into her doorstep, so she gets confused whether to open her heart after so many years of isolation.
