I had despaired after reading Dragon Ridden last year and discovering that it was published in 2012 that a second book would ever get written. I mean, it does happen, right? Luckily, T. A. White didn't leave me waiting long! Unfortunately for those of you that read the first novel 5 years ago, you'll probably have to re-read it just to remember the subtleties of the plot. Not me! I remembered Tate, her Dragon tattoo that moved crazily around her body, and the adventures or scrapes she got herself into in Dragon Ridden, just as if I had read it yesterday. Of Bone and Ruin picks up right where the first novel lets off and I was quickly hooked again on Tate and her status now as Dragon Ridden.

This is a fun fantasy series in the same vein as a Robert Jordan or Piers Anthony. Kind of old fashioned with great friendships, action, and a lot of heart. Tate is your average heroine. She is special because she is Dragon Ridden, or has merged with a Dragon and can shift into its shape. But she's also special because she doesn't have a memory of it. A woman merging with a dragon is extremely rare and that makes Tate a mystery that everyone wants to solve. As the story unfolds in Of Bone and Ruin, some of Tate's mysterious background is revealed, memories surface and Tate becomes even more interesting to the reader. Her relationship to Rhys (also Dragon Ridden) or at least his feelings for her become a little more substantial, but this is in no way a romance novel. Although it is nice to see the growth of their characters and the evolution of all of the relationships is very natural.

I have really enjoyed the first two novels in this series, but if I have to wait another 5 years? Well, hopefully I won't have to...

This is the 2nd book in the Dragon Ridden Chronicles. It's about a girl named Tate that doesn't remember anything of her life before a few months ago. What she does know is that she has a bond with a dragon who actually lives as a tattoo on her skin and can move around. When she is in danger or distress she can transform into this dragon. This is baffling to the few people that do know (which is slowly becoming everybody) because a woman has never survived the transformation/bond aka become one of the dragon ridden, before. She is a former crew member of a pirate ship so she knows the sneaky, conniving ways of thieves and pirates. She slowly but surely creates a small crew of misfits that slowly turn into a family. They include another dragon ridden (Ryu) (who may or may not stay in the cool club if he keeps acting up), a young boy who was a former pickpocket and thief (Dewdrop), and a former experiment cat/lynx/wildcat animal (Night) who is a single dad of 2 precious, and devious, little cubs. This book brings an entire new adventure that Tate goes bumbling and fumbling in unknowingly uncovering bad guys while ruining their plots and carefully laid out plans. This book requires Tate to act as a witness for a mediator in a dispute involving three factions. When a discovery of great importance is found, the three factions are at each other's throats (more than usual) at claiming the find. The Kairi (sea people, cold, strict), the humans, and the Silva (shifters, hot tempered). The peace meeting goes awry when a murder occurs and other mayhem is underfoot. Needless to say this was an action filled book filled with mystery. I loved not knowing what was going to happen next. It was truly unique and I can't wait to read the next.

I love this series, T. A. White has a magic recipe for success with Tate's Chronicles. The second in this series is the weakest of the three current books, but it's still a delightful journey.

I enjoyed the introduction of the third race and the development of the A.I. in the ancient ruins. As always, Tate has just enough knowledge to get into trouble, and the resourcefulness to navigate out again.

It's a joy to have a female lead going through a classic heroes journey in the same way men do instead of over playing her femininity. Rare is there the "you're a woman" moment, instead people respect or acknowledge other qualities Tate has and respond to those. There's something refreshing in having a female lead who just gets to be herself.

The sense of "chosen one" develops now, but it's not strong. Instead of suggesting fate "picked" her, the novels lead the reader to acknowledge Tate as a person with singular history and skills that make her able to complete missions others can't. Tate isn't alone in her sense of "chosen" the other Dragon Ridden we meet seem also "called" to certain tasks. Even Night and Josh seem to be the only ones to manage certain feats. Giving each character a speciality helps diminish the "Harry Potter prophecy" feel that can get tiring to revisit in too many books, especially when the chosen one doesn't seem to have skills.

Would recommend to anyone who likes fantasy, action, and strong female leads.
