#### **Loved the second book**

I loved the second book in this series, although I read the previous reviews and they weren't kind I decided to read the second book in the series based on the merit of the first book. The second book did not disappoint it was just as amazing as the first and its left me anticipating the third book. If you loved the first book you will love the second book.

I mention in my review of book 1 (link below) that the premise of this series doesn't make sense and that the writing is awful, and none of that is any better in this book, though I did like a few things in this book, and that's more than I can say for book 1. I don't know why I read further than book 1 tbh, but here I am waiting for book 3. That said, it's anyone's guess whether I'll still have the patience for this series whenever the next book comes out.

I apparently lost all the notes that I made for this book (wtf???), but I'll try my best to remember the main things that stood out to me.

I mentioned in my review of book 1 that I dislike how the misogyny is so black and white in this series, and that doesn't get any better in this book. The author portrays all the misogynists as people who want to kill or sexually assault the MC, so of course she's validated in wiping them out. I still want the author to address the more-subtle and relatively "harmless" forms of misogyny. Does the author want the MC to kill men who tell women whom they've never met to smile or who hold doors for women (suggesting they are too weak to do so themselves)? Does the author want the MC to kill misogynist women? Also, I still think it's ridiculous that Persephone only cares about misogyny in wolf shifters, a relatively teeny percentage of the population. I forgot to mention this in my review of book 1, but I thought it was weird that the author used a Greek goddess as a character but didn't give her any of the powers traditionally associated with her, just powers she presumably got from Hades. As such, I was happy that she has fertility powers in this book.

I disliked a few other moments in this book as well. For example, the MC spends a good deal of time lamenting that she doesn't really know how to use her death powers, but then the perspective shifts and one of the guys narrates, and she's suddenly skilled enough with the power to threaten someone. I assume that she figured it out while we weren't in her head, but that made this ability come out of nowhere. Also, I didn't like how the author handled the MC's relationship with Declan in this book. The MC complains that he's avoiding her, but I hadn't seen that at all. Then he doesn't give her the reaction that she wants when they talk about it, so they're tense with each other for most of the book. But then he's just suddenly in her bed wanting to make up, and that seemed to come out of nowhere as well. I didn't feel like I understood what made him suddenly decide to apologize, and I have no idea why he thought that was the way to do it. It was enough to make me wonder whether he had other motives, like wanting to benefit from the fertility powers that he just learned that the MC got from Persephone. Then there's a weird moment when they're suddenly having sex, even though she never takes her pants off and we have every reason to think that she was wearing them

before this (She explicitly mentions putting her shirt on before getting into bed with him, so I can't imagine her taking the pants off then). Furthermore, one of the chapters near the end had a summary of the chapter before the actual chapter, which was super weird. It was like the author forgot to delete her outline.

\*\*Update\*\* I forgot to mention this in my original post because I pointed it out in one of my deleted notes, but it bothered me in this book that the MC mentioned knowing about Persephone myths before finding out about their relationship because I know for a fact that she didn't have that knowledge in book 1 (I mention in my review that I thought it was super weird that she hadn't heard of Persephone).

As I said, this book had some things that I actually liked! For example, I was kind of getting a suggestion that we might get some harem mm in later books? At one point, Graham mentions going to a bedroom that he often visits and hoping to get some sleep. It wouldn't really make sense to say that if he was going to his own bedroom, but as I said in my review of book 1, this author often says things that don't make sense or uses words incorrectly, so I was trying not to get my hopes up. But then like an hour or so later, he was downstairs in the kitchen with Rylan—and by process of elimination, I had assumed that Graham was talking about Rylan's bedroom (I couldn't picture him with the other two). I'm just saying, that's suspicious. And then Lucas later comments that he had never seen Rylan pursue women before, though he was sure that it had happened at some point. Still, the phrasing made me wonder whether Lucas had seen him pursue men. Even if that wasn't the author's intention, Ryham/Gralan is canon in my head now.

The ending felt sudden—I actually turned the page expecting to have more to read—but maybe that's because I had just finally started to really get into the story. I hate tagging spoilers in my reviews because then my review previews get censored on the app (lol), so just know that everything below my rating for the previous book involves a spoiler, though I suggest reading the spoiler because it addresses something that some people consider a book pet peeve and something that might trigger people. In fact, I'm pretty sure that the potential for mm and the spoiler that I'll discuss below are the only reasons that I'm looking forward to the next book.

I usually put these at the end of the review, but I wanted to separate the spoiler from the rest of the text, and some people may stop here anyway, so here are my review and rating of the previous book in the series: Divine ★★★

Without any further ado, here's the spoiler: We find out near the end of this book that the MC is pregnant, and I knew that she was as soon as she started sleeping so much; I'm actually really happy about it. I know some people really dislike pregnant main characters, and I'm picky about them too. For example, I don't like when we only see a brief moment late in the pregnancy in epilogues, and I don't like when the pregnancy is all fluff to show the men being over-protective. I think that type of pregnancy, which suggests that pregnancies are part of all women's happy endings, wouldn't fit this anti-misogyny book, so I was glad that this series isn't doing that. I like angst in my book pregnancies, and if the book is an RH, I don't want the MC to know who the father is. I got both those things here. I love that the MC wasn't immediately happy about the pregnancy, and I like that she tried to keep it from the guys for a bit. Most of all though, I like that this seems like it's going to be a dangerous pregnancy for her, as she's already bleeding. I know those issues can be triggering for some people, so watch out, especially as we go into book 3.
