The author would have done well to provide more in-depth analyses when it comes to the whys and hows of liturgy since Episcopalians belong to a very liturgical church. Much of the book covers basic elements common to being Christian no matter the tradition; this space could've been better utilized. There are several lists (top ten Bible heroes, villains, etc) that seem contingent on the author's own preferences. Under "villains" one may find listed "Pharisees, Sadducees and scribes." Without clarifying that those who persecuted Jesus were individuals in a particular time and place, this classification easily lends itself to anti-Semitism. The most helpful part of the book was the extensive glossary of terms.
