Not all the characters are clearly defined and with strong personalities, but at least the most important ones - Harriet, the police officer, most of the women characters - can be easily visualised with a bit of imagination.

This was an easy book to read. I got it free on Amazon, so you can't really complain. However, this is a review and I'll be honest. I found the writing style very stilted. It was lie Harriet was telling us what happen in a laundry list of short sentences. Rather than draw the reader into the story so they felt a part of the action, I found this to be distracting. It was like Harriet was doing what she did to keep the reader at a distance.

I like cozy mysteries. There are some tropes that are easy enough to notice and the love interest cop who gives good advice, only to be bluntly ignored is obviously gold in these style of books. I have to say though, my biggest annoyance with Harriet was her need to point the finger of suspicion at every single character before arriving at a conclusion that needed the books final chapter to explain.

I had no idea who the murder was in this book, not for lack of trying either. I eventually decided on the killer, based on the fact Harriet hadn't yet decided they were the killer.

I feel the book could have done with some editing. Particularly toward the end there were a lot of little typos. Words like in instead of on. Again, nothing super bad about it, it was just annoying.

It was a good book though and the first in the series it gets a bit of leeway.
