What I liked: It gives a number of short anecdotes describing various aspects of friendship between women. While the anecdotes were mostly too short to be very meaningful, they made me reflect on a lot of my friendships in life, and that part I liked. Makes me want to record some of the thoughts it brought to mind in writing and maybe share with some of the friends that inspired them.

What I didn't like: How I would love to see a literary work that can celebrate women without the need to stoop to male bashing. While there wasn't a lot of male bashing, because the book is not about men, they weren't able to entirely refrain from it. It also tends to glorify the "bad girl". Just think of all the speed bumps and scrapes we might have avoided in life if today's world wasn't trying to pound it into women that they need to be "bad" to be who they really are. What the world needs more of right now is Integrity, Respect and Self-Discipline (IRS, an unfortunate acronym). Also, after talking a lot about how every relationship will have its unique qualities, in the end they make a blanket recommendation that all female friendships develop a ritual of some sort. That's as silly as saying all friendships need to spend a weekend at the beach every year (which is fine for some, but not needed for all).
