This was without a doubt one of the slowest moving books I ever wrote. Foster appears to have been trying to write a parody of society, and since that plays a part in "Jed's" identity, I guess he sort of succeeds.

Ross Ed finds a dead alien in the back of a cave and begins to carry it around. Why anyone would carry around a dead alien body is beyond me and it isn't long until I felt the basic premise was silly, but kept plodding away at it anyway. It isn't long before Ross Ed discovers that the alien's suit is somehow alive and communicating in strange ways. He pretends the alien is a ventriliquist dummy and develops and act, but soon gets the attention of Army intelligence, as well as a few other folks.. most of them wackos.

There are moments of sheer genius in the novel-- like the New Age Circle that Jed reprimands for their odd behavior. along the way, the suit offers some protection from those who would do Ross harm. The cleverness of Foster's writing manages to skewer Alien afficianados, Hollywood, the music industry, and those who don't like parody type writing. The revelation at the end of the novel of who and what Jed is ties closely to some of Foster's apparent purpose.

This is not a terribly funny book, but it has its moments. It is not very exciting. It probably is worth reading for its parody value, but is not all that entertaining.

Someone likened it to the silly Alien movie "Paul" but in comparison, even with its vulgarity and crudeness and stupid earthlings, "Paul" was much funnier and much more entertaining.

This is a fun romp through several alien encounter tropes. The first fifty pages are slow - the author seems to have just been through a "show don't tell" clinic. There's a point at which you are reading so much detail that you don't actually know what's going on, kind of being prevented from seeing the forest because there's so much detail about each tree. In addition, there's only so much plot that can be driven by a dead alien before it starts to get stale.

It only starts to get stale, though, and then gets interesting again. The author pulls in a number of different alien interaction ideas to keep things fresh, and the dry humor is gently funny. The pacing, explanations, and detail are a bit uneven (e.g. there's too much description of the main character up front, and then next to none about another main character later), which is surprising for a veteran author. Still, it's worth a read, particularly if you enjoy the alien science fiction genre and have a sense of humor.
