I liked the story itself. Two high school students that are bookworms get drawn into an ancient conflict. There's magic, adventure, good vs evil, all that good stuff. I just had an issue with the writing. I couldn't get sucked in at the beginning with all the wordiness. More adjectives were thrown out than necessary. Kind of felt like a student trying to meet a minimum page requirement in a school writing assignment. Or like being forced to reread *The Grapes of Wrath*. There were a lot of silly mistakes like spaces missing between words (probably at least one a chapter). And then there were statements that made me laugh and facepalm. At one point, we're told that a character is petrified "as though turned to stone." Dunno how else you'd interpret petrified. Turned to plastic? And at another point, not far after that line, we're told that a 'sexton' is a navigational tool. It's a sextant. I'm a speed reader, and every time I run into one of these mistakes, I slow down. If they're too frequent, I have to have short reading periods. I get so frustrated seeing these kinds of mistakes. Some are *really* easy to catch just by using a normal word processing software. Others, I can't get why someone wouldn't just look up a word to make sure it's the right one if it's not something they've seen a lot.

I do try to keep the 'writing' separate from the 'storytelling' when forming an opinion, because these books are by authors. The story is what's important. But in this case, they really detracted from my enjoyment of the tale.

That being said, I'm still going on to read the sequel :) So far, it seems to be a bit cleaner. The story really is interesting, and this book is worth reading if for no other reason than to know the backstory for book 2. But be warned that if you're a bit nitpicky like me, it'll be a slow read.

If I could give 1/2 ratings, I think this book ranks as more of a 3.5. The beginning of this book was a little difficult to get into, mainly due to the writing style. There was a lot of seemingly unnecessary metaphorical descriptions that really weighed down the first 30 pages or so. But I'm glad I stuck it out, because once the story really got going, those weird descriptions stopped popping up so much. "Legend of the Book Keeper" is a solid adventure story with an interesting take on the "chosen one" trope. Cody is an ordinary person who stumbles into a power he was not born for or destined for, just a wrong place-wrong time moment. He's a typical teenager with mood swings and he makes mistakes, lets power go to his head, and his best friend Jade is the one who needs to keep him grounded.

I enjoyed this book, and I am curious to find out what happens next, but in the end it is sequel I will pick up if I stumble across it, not one I will seek out.
