It has been three years since Benedict and Katherine have seen each other -- he thinks she is "as clumsy as she is mad" and she thinks he is dull and hopes she won't be ruined just by merely associating with him. Not your recipe for perfect love.

When she sees him, she apologizes for past incidences when she almost killed him (accidentally, of course!) - he asks her to dance - she gets her foot caught and twisted in the bottom of her skirt - he helps her out into the balcony - she loses her balance and kicks him in the head - he falls backward - she tries to see if he is okay and lands on top of him - and before she can extricate herself from that position, they are "discovered" in their accidental compromising position! And everyone is asking when they are going to be married -- in fact, Agatha is insisting on it!

It isn't long before he finds himself wanting to marry her -- She provokes, enflames, and intrigues him! He feels totally out of control. Then he gets invited to a 4-day house party by Lord Marks. He accepts hoping to put Katherine in disastrous situations so he can be reminded of all the reasons he doesn't like her. Nothing goes according to plan, and it doesn't even take the full two weeks for both to be irrevocably in love with the other!

I absolutely love Rachel van Dyken, her books are always excellent reads. Her House Of Renwick series is a fan favourite and I am no exception, so when I found out that she had written another story that concerned such well-loved characters I was over the moon and downloaded it to my Kindle instantly.

The Devil Duke Takes A Bride follows the Duke of Banbury, a man whose reputation in society goes beyond that of a rake and dips into the realms of making him someone to be feared. He is notorious for ruining the reputations of young girls, and as such has been nicknamed 'The Devil Duke'. His aunt, who continually believes herself to be on her death bed, asks the Duke (Benedict) to settle down and get himself a wife before she dies. He is dead set against the idea, but his aunt's plans work when he finds himself in a compromising situation with Katherine, trapping him in an engagement with someone who has plagued his life since childhood. She is against the idea of marriage to Benedict and makes her views plain to him from the start, which in turn encourages feelings of lust and want in him that lead him to see Katherine in a different light and slowly come round to his aunt's way of thinking. Question is, can he make Katherine see that he is willing to redeem himself for her?

Benedict was a great male lead – he was portrayed as something beyond your typical rake, not just willing to ruin a woman's reputation but notorious for being the spawn of the devil himself. He started off as a stand-offish, arrogant and proud beyond compare of what his reputation had become. However, the transition from this to a man who was deeply in love with someone as appealing as Katherine wasn't a stretch of the imagination, as (like most of these male leads) his vulnerability is hidden beyond the surface and he was endearing as a man who was head over heels and not always sure how to handle it.

Katherine was a feisty female lead, initially portrayed as clumsy and awkward, this later became one of her most charming qualities. Being (what some would call) a typical woman, she showed the right of a woman to change her mind, as she realised that her perceptions of love and experiencing real love were actually two very different things. Watching her deal with this transition made her very relatable as a character, even to a

modern day woman like myself.

On the whole I really enjoyed this story but there were two small things which prevented me from giving it 5 out of 5 as I have done with many other Rachel van Dyken novels. The first was the speed at which the relationship between the two protagonists developed; it was a fantastically written relationship and watching it progress made for a very entertaining read, but it felt like one minute they were putting up with each other for the sake of perception and reputation and the next they were head over heels. This is something that I'm used to reading given the types of novels I read, but what made this stand out for me was the speedy transition that Katherine made from one way of thinking to another – it seemed almost instantaneous given that a third person was involved in the equation. The second was the lack of appearances made by other House Of Renwick characters; they were dotted here and there throughout the story but I expected them to be more prominent – they're appearances almost felt like token gestures.

Taken as its own story, this book was a great easy read and I continue to enjoy the books that Rachel van Dyken produces.
