When I was a child, this was my favorite book. The children, on vacation in an English country house, are told that there will be a guest arriving who speaks only French. The guest also happens to be musical, so in addition to teaching the children French, he teaches piano skills to those who are interested.

Another guest arrives. I think this one, a woman, was a writing and drama teacher. Of course, the children didn't think of her as a teacher, but as a fun guest who helped them to write well.

At some point, the children realized that they had been 'going to school without knowing it'! Fun!

From this book, I learned that there might be other ways to be schooled besides the way I knew it -- which was being confined all day to a desk that was bolted to the floor (and above all, do not speak to one's classmates except at recess time.) In other words, a typical 1940's school.

When I read 'Maida's Little School', school attendance was compulsory and home schooling was illegal, so the story seemed like a fantasy, but a 'might-be-possible fantasy'.

'Maida's Little School' also included some French phrases which young readers could understand from context. This pleased me very much, as a child, because I could learn what the story-book characters were learning.

I adored this story. I hesitated to give the book 5 stars because the writing is not quite what it could have been. The children are each introduced with descriptions of the 'sparkling eyes and bouncing curls' variety. If Inez Haynes Irwin were writing today, I'm certain that she would revise these descriptions. I mention this because it might put off some of today's young readers, but it is a minor flaw in a book that gave me so much pleasure.

Mentions of fairies, elves, etc. are scattered throughout the book in the children's playtime or imaginations. Mentions the Ice Age. Uses of "good gracious" "goodness" "gee" and the like.
