Chloe Gibson is the daughter of Penelope, town doctor and the woman who used to be hopelessly in love with Raul. But how could Chloe be his daughter if he and Penelope were never together? Unless the dreams he's been having the past twelve years of making love to Penelope were actually memories...

Penelope Gibson was crushed after a drunken mistake at a wedding between her and Raul ends with him not only not remembering, but leaving town without saying goodbye. The one bright spot of the situation was the daughter she had. But when Chloe brings Raul back into Penelope's life, Penelope's torn between wanting to protect her and her daughter's heart and wanting to fall back into the arms of the man she has loved for so long. Raul will have his work cut out for him if he wants to regain the trust and love he lost long ago.

Dee Tenorio has definitely delivered a burning hot reunion romance with *Burn for Me*. Penelope is a heroine you have to love. Raul Montenga and Penelope Gibson have a very long history including a drunken encounter at a wedding reception that neither is quite sure happened the way they remember. Penelope's daughter, Chloe, finally makes them both face up to facts and answer some burning questions.

Raul is the fire chief in town. He left RDC back in his twenties to get away from his overbearing father and the life his father laid out for him. He returned 10 years later after a tragedy and stayed. While he spends time with his family now, he's still a little disconnected. Raul has had dreams for years of Penelope, dreams he doesn't understand. Things become somewhat clearer when 10 year old Chloe knocks on his door one day.

Penelope is one of the town's only doctors. Despite coming home from college unwed and pregnant, she's held her head up high and is well respected in town. She knows she wouldn't have made it without her Mother's help which she is grateful for but she knows she let her very proper Mother down. She is a devoted mother to Chloe. She enjoys the company of her friends but pretty much avoids any other relationships.

Chloe is a bright, somewhat foul mouthed, daring girl who has no problems asking questions or telling

people how she feels. She loves her mother fiercely but she is curious about the man that fathered her. The man that her mother never talks about at all.

Usually in books where there is an unplanned pregnancy that the mother never tells the father, it angers me. However, I never felt that way in this book. I don't want to say anymore because I don't want to spoil it but I will say there was a reason. It might have been a little weak, but it was plausible and I let it go. What I admire about this book is the fact that this little girl and her best friend pretty much figure things out which leads to Chloe confronting the man she thinks is her father and her mother as well. The relationship between Chloe and her mother really changes during this book. They both have to learn to give and trust each other a little more. In addition, the relationship between Raul and Penelope simmers, boils, fizzles, and then boils again. I love the fact that Raul really had Pen figured out and he would step back when needed to let her catch up. I also love that he went in with both guns blazing knowing exactly what he wanted. He didn't shy away from anything and given the situation, he could have really been a jerk. Then there are the outside family issues on both sides that create problems, some of which are really hard to excuse or overcome.

I can honestly say with Dee's books in addition to a good romance, she always makes you think. She addresses some issues that most people wouldn't find pleasant and she does it well. This book is a little "rawer" than her previous two books. The language is a little rougher and the sex scenes a little hotter. I'm totally not complaining, just a little warning. Dee's books always seem to take me by surprise. While some authors rely on a formula for their books, her style seems to change from book to book. This is not a bad thing; it's just different from most authors I read regularly and I applaud her for keeping me on my toes!

While I've enjoyed the other books in this series quite a bit, I really loved this book. I don't know if it's the "oops" pregnancy, the hero discovering what he'd always been missing, the heroine learning to live and love, or the ten year old "oops" stealing the scenes. This book is touching, amazingly funny, discusses some tough issues and prejudices, and yet evolves into a really great love story.

This has to be my least favorite book in the series, I just didn't connect with it as much. Raul the hero is the Captain of the firefighters and came to town a year ago after he ran from his family's expectations of joining the family business and marrying one of the family friends. He comes from a big Latino family and his wild teenage years were quite a disappointment to his father.

He finds himself dreaming of Penny, as he has been for so many years, the dreams are so real but the Penny now doesn't seem to notice him at all. When they were little and teenagers Penny worshipped him, followed him around and even loved him, Raul cared for her and defended her but knew he wasn't good enough for her, not when he wanted to leave so kept himself away from accepting what she offered, then he finds an eleven year old Chloe on his doorstep who asks him is he her father?

He goes to Penny. Penny has come a long way from that girl who worshipped Raul, his leaving changed her, she became drunk at a friend's wedding and lost her virginity to an equally drunk Raul in a closet, atleast she thinks it was him and then she went mad and hooked up with the first guy she met in college, when she wound up pregnant she didn't know whose kid it was, though she has suspected for years it was Raul, the tests prove it.

I found Chloe quite adorable, she was a handful and outspoken and prone to trouble. Raul took on his

responsibilities, he didn't know he had a child and when he learnt that he started making up for lost time and even defended Penny to the town. He wants a second chance with Penny, he was a selfish guy when he was younger and didn't realize what he lost and now he wants it back, his friend Josh tells him it won't be easy and he knows that, Penny doesn't trust him and doesn't want to be around him, he has to show her that he has changed. He makes her see that she wasn't someone he had sex with in a closet and forgot, his dreams came from memory, even if he couldn't recall that and he never forgot her and pitied her and in a way came back for her.

Raul and even Chloe tell Penny that she is turning into her mother and that is something she never wanted, her mother loves her but she is an iceberg, she helped Penny when she had an infant in medical school but her disappointment was always felt by her. Raul's desertion kind of blew the spark in her, she built walls around her and doesn't let anyone close and when she finds them crumbling she goes to Raul.

Plus Penny also had a fear of Raul's mom who had realized at the age of 4, whose daughter Chloe was and told her that she would never allow someone white to be a part of her family.

I enjoy seeing a hero give chase and this book is about that, Penny is so wary and this time around doesn't give Raul an inch, but I still ended up finding the book decent and not wow'ed by it.

It was the characters, rather than the plot, that made me like this novel. The plot is pretty familiar, and I could have predicted how the story would run through its course. However, its the characters in this story that baffled me. I fell in love with some, and I hated some.

I was surprised that Raul didn't really fight the fact that he had a kid with Penelope, he was mildly surprised, but that was it. He welcomed Chloe with open arms and hoped that the mother wanted to start a family with him.

Penelope, on the other hand, changed. She was not the girl he used to know back then. Perhaps it was the single parenthood that drove her to be almost but not totally like her pragmatic mother. She had survived med school with an infant and continued to be a single mother until a DNA test proved that her daughter was indeed Raul's.

Chloe - how can you not fall in love with her? From the first chapter, up to the last part of the novel - she's a darling. Chloe is witty, amazing, a little bit crazy, and wonderful kind of girl. I would also like to add that if her age wasn't mentioned, I would have guessed that she was older because of the way she handled things (much better than her older folks)- it was more mature, simpler and less complicated. She's the character that brought life to this novel and surely you'd like her too.

I hate Raul's mother, I don't think what she did was fair to both Raul and Penelope, most especially to Chloe. In addition, the reason for her actions are completely outrageous, and I feel sad for the rest of Raul's family for allowing their mother to act/feel that way for a long time. Maybe, if someone has already talked to her in the first place and made her realize things then Raul wouldn't a lot of Chloe's life.

Nevertheless, despite the usual plot, I enjoyed reading **Burn for Me**. It tackles not only about steamy make-up sex but as well as family dynamics, social stigma on single parenthood, racism, effects of trauma and second chances.

He had to give her plenty of space and have patience with her so she could learn to trust him again. It was very powerful and romantic. First, I have to tell you that contemporary romance and I have a tenuous relationship at best. Yet twelve years ago, Raul left the small town of Rancho Del Cielo, determined to strike out on his own because the cookie-cutter life his parents wanted him to settle into felt more like a cage than a real beginning. But now he's back in town with a new job as Captain of the local fire station, along with a bevy of elicit dreams starring a certain woman he never had the pleasure of touching. At least, he doesn't remember touching her, until he wakes up to find an eleven year old version of his dream girl standing on his doorstep, claiming to be his daughter.

Dr. Penelope Gibson has made a few mistakes in her life. However, when her daughter, Chloe, slips through the door to her office with the former love of her life in tow, it takes almost everything she has not to add another to her ever growing list. Just the sight of Raul's gorgeous face and hard body makes her ache to touch him again, but when he demands an explanation for Chloe's surprising claims, Penelope's mind overrules her hormones and calls for an all out emotional retreat. And though keeping the only man she's ever loved at arm's reach might be what she thinks she wants...her heart has a completely different agenda.

I never thought I'd say this, but Dee Tenorio has lured me over to the contemporary romance Dark Side. This is the first Dee Tenorio book I've read and I was impressed. The writing style was smooth and it evoked sadness, happiness, hope, and lust. It was emotionally charged, and has a rich story full of interesting characters. It was also fast-paced, the feelings were direct to the point, the conflicts worked well, and the sex scenes while fewer than I expected, were scorching hot.

It started out slow, but when Chloe dropped the bomb and the paternity tests confirmed she is Raul and Penelope's daughter, I simply couldn't stop reading it. This isn't the first inter-racial romance I've read, but this one emphasizes the cultural differences, discrimination, acceptance of blood ties, and family values.

Raul and Penelope are likeable characters. Penelope is a strong woman who held her head up high, she's resilient and she embodies all the protective mothers out there. Raul is one hot daddy, I wished for someone like him for myself when he started courting Penelope the old-fashioned way. He proved his love for her by

admitting to the whole town how he took advantage of her, and he took all the blame to protect her and his child. That's what endeared him to me the most.

While this story is fiction, it happens in real life. I also liked the humor here, how the characters developed, and how the author presented Lorna (Penelope's mother) in a new light.
