And Kick's efforts to redeem the situation are severely limited only to the immediate problem. Which could easily resurface. For somebody so savvy (Kick), this just reads as illogical and rather selfishly narcissistic. The title warned me of this cronyism; I just hoped for a little more Disney ending (esp. since a really cool nun was involved).
