It's been years since she's been back, but due to a death in the family, she finds herself back home, and runs into Adam on the very first day, and he claims to still be in love with her, wanting to be with her. When they spend time together, old feelings resurface, and a heartbreak secret is finally revealed. Will Adam's feelings change when she breaks his heart one last time, or will time help heal the wounds that have been fresh for both of them for so long?

Ripple tore me apart. I was a mess reading this book, but in such a good way. I love when a book is so powerful and emotional that I can barely see my Kindle screen as tears falls on my cheeks, and Ripple did just that.

After reading the synopsis, I thought I had a pretty good idea about what to expect. Wow! Did I miss the mark! Ripple is not a typical I-have-regrets-about-my-past story. It is so very much more. Admittedly, I was a little hesitant as the story gets underway. I tend to shy away from NA/YA stories, so when the story flashes back from present to a time when the main characters are high school sweethearts, I was really worried about whether I'd be able to sustain the story. Well, let me just say that not only did I sustain it, this story compelled me in ways that surprised me, and soon enough, the story returns to present day, as the characters face the aftermath of decisions made long ago.

Author L.D. Cedergreen gives us wholesome and likable characters in Kendall Brooks and Adam McCoy. Even as high school students, these two characters are intelligent, mature, and even (dare I say) sensual. Predictably, the trajectory of their life (and relationship) begins to change as they confront graduation and college. As they reach pinnacles in their respective lives, Adam and Kendi make individual choices, which they believe at the time is in the best interest of the other, without realizing the far-reaching impact of those decisions.

Ripple addresses a very difficult social issue in ways that challenge the reader to consider their own perspectives and beliefs. I found myself angry and frustrated at times with both characters, while at the same time respecting some extremely ethical, tough, responsible decisions on the part of each of them. Ripple asks the reader to consider whether deception (even for the right reasons) is the ultimate betrayal, or whether forgiveness is the fundamental balm that heals all.
