AJ Rose's books are some of the hardest books on the planet to write reviews for, because the threads of her stories are always so interwoven that it's almost impossible to say something that isn't going to be a spoiler. Maybe it's because she knits.

This was not my typical AJ Rose reading experience. I usually block off release day and spend the entire day reading cover to cover. This time I didn't have that luxury and I ended up reading this in small segments. It's for that reason only, I had a little trouble following the timeline in the beginning. Most readers will have no problem following the jumps back and forth in time. (Those usually annoy the heck out of me, by the way, but for some reason, in *Anatomy of Perception*, I actually enjoyed them for the first time ever.)

Since I can't really discuss any specifics of the story, I'll take this opportunity to tell you what I love about AJ's writing. She has a way of selecting THE perfect words and using them create a movie in my mind as I read. Some authors paint me a picture with their words. AJ shoots video.

"‘I thought I was saving you from me.’ He detonated, arms flailing in an explosion of anger and pain and disbelief."

"...his excited expression melted like a Dali clock."

As I went through my list of highlights to write this, I realize I'd highlighted HUGE chunks of text – not just passages and paragraphs - but PAGES of text that moved me, usually to anger or tears. I highlighted practically the entire scene involving Craig, Dane, Holly and Braden at a restaurant. It led me to send Ms. Rose a message on Facebook in the middle of the night saying, "What is it with you and bathroom stalls?" (Still haven't recovered from that scene with Jackson in *Queers*).

There's a lot of angst, but humor sprinkled throughout. A scene with Craig's autistic students had me giggling in glee. But just like in real life, one moment I was cracking up over a student asking Craig, "What's happening in Dane Perry's pants that you want to see?" and the next moment AJ blindsided me with Craig stating, "I've been talking to Dane again for two months and five days." Doesn't sound like much, but trust me - in the context of the story, it was like someone had thrown a live grenade in the classroom.

I don't know what was harder to read: watching Dane slip into the depths of hell or watching Craig watch him fall. Leave it to AJ Rose to tackle slipping into the grips of mental illness - in first person. Again... the choice of words here is huge.

"...a pending explosion felt imminent. The worms, they squirmed; the icicle, it froze and pierced; and the clock, it ticked in the dark. Outside the windows, nameless judges stared in at us, leaving me exposed and raw even as I tried to burrow and burrow and burrow into Craig's sunshine."

"My insides were a mess, as though I'd eaten a slab of Jell-o and gotten on a roller coaster." (How perfect is that??)

I adored Dane and I felt myself trying to help Craig and Holly hang onto him when he was slipping. And

Craig...? I loved Craig from the moment he appeared on the page and that love grew and grew and grew. Just thinking of him now is bringing me to tears. He's not perfect, but, dammit, he's got a beautiful soul.

It's obvious how deeply Dane loves Craig. He says himself, "I had Craig, who I loved so much I'd ripped myself in half to set him free...." But I realize now, I have no highlighted words of love from Craig to Dane - no giant passages or pages of declarations, but that's okay, because now that all the threads have been woven together, I see that this story was maybe never really about how much Dane loved Craig - but how much Craig loved Dane.

Oh, and if you follow AJ on social media, you'll get a big kick out of the description of Craig's new therapist. I was laughing through my tears.

I was somewhat intrigued as this started, puzzle pieces of Dane Perry's life randomly revealed. Jumps back and forth between the past and present gave it a dreamlike quality, a nonlinear revelation of those puzzle pieces. It also meant it took a while to get a handle on the intended focus for this story. The more I read, the less important the flashback chapters felt. Events referenced in the present are then explained in great detail in the past. Unfortunately, for me, it was unnecessary and lessened the impact of those events taking place in the here and now, the built up tension lost.

Dane has been through a lot, his entire life a series of incredible personal challenges. He's internalized them, like most people do, and they've influenced every decision he's made, especially in regards to personal relationship, no matter the type. How does he work himself back into his own life? How does he try to help the ones he loves in understanding it all? Understanding him? *This* is where the story was strongest, when focused on the how and when and with whom Dane was struggling to do these very things, in the present.

There was a lot of research that went into writing this story: how hospital admin functions, internships and physical therapy, medical conditions, both physical and mental, and psychiatry. It all helped build the world of this story but it also overwhelmed it. The casualties were the characters and my ability to remain connected to them. Further, emotional gains made became emotional gains lost.

Dane's story is one of someone working extremely hard at overcoming their fears, especially those embedded by the very people who were supposed to treasure him and did not.

Craig is the man who... well, he just might be the one tool Dane is missing in his mission to change his life, make it better, make it *his* again. Actually, not again, but *finally*. I don't want to give anything away but they're good together when they're together. Compassionate. Caring. Forgiving. Truthful, no matter the end result. This is the biggest reason the chapters that take place in present day drew me in when they did. This was the story that was begging to be told, to be the star in the spotlight, not shuffled to the side of the stage, alternating with the past.

Rose's writing is always smooth, confident, and utterly honest. No exception here. I just wish the well written story had grabbed a hold of me, making it impossible to forget, giving me that feeling of oh my gosh I want to get back to reading this book. For me, that didn't happen here. I was curious but not compelled. This could truly be a case of it's not you, it's me. It feels like that must be the case given the evident research conducted, the depth of pain Dane carries, the excellent writing and all of the rest.

I have said this before and I will say it again. I have no qualms whatsoever being sincere in my reviews. However, there are times when it sucks being honest, esp. when I have to review a book that didn't live up to my expectations and is written by a favorite author. Believe me, I would have loved to gush over *The Anatomy of Perception* and, since my reading year hasn't been stellar so far, I was hoping for a mind-blowingly great read. Yet it's a sad fact that AJ's latest book couldn't rock my book world. I'm also aware that it's not fair to compare every future work of AJ to her *Power Exchange* series (*Power Exchange*, *Safeword*, *Consent*). But I will regardless. Neither the story nor the characters of *The Anatomy of Perception* were on a

par with her Power Exchange series, let alone outmatch this outstanding series.

"I love you, and I want the world to know it. Even if you need time, it doesn't change how I feel about you."

He kissed me, his hands threading into my hair and clenching into fists, my scalp stinging as he pulled me in. He devoured me, bringing his leg up and around my hip to trap me against him. He electrified me, delving with his tongue like my mouth was his breath of life, and he wanted to own me.

He did own me. He always had.

The story is told in two concurrent timelines. Dane, who is not out and proud, meets Craig, a hot street artist, in October 2005. Though when Craig wants to paint Dane, he declines.

"I'm sorry. I really can't. Maybe I'll see you around though."

"Me or my ass?" he asked, dropping his volume and giving me a wink. So he had seen me checking out the goods.

(...)

"Both." It was the best parting line I'd ever had, so I took advantage, chuckling as I walked away.

The next morning when Dane is on his way to class, he stumbles upon a commotion, people taking pictures of...Dane himself whose face is plastered billboard sized on the side of a concrete building. Dane, for obvious reasons that readers will get to know about, is not out for any kind of publicity and is eager to remove the graffiti as soon as possible. He asks his best friend (and beard) Holly to lend him a helping hand. Over the course of the next few months, Craig is happily drawing Dane's face all over Manhattan and Dane keeps removing the pictures. In April 2006 they meet again at the occasion of yet another huge graffiti of Dane. They have a cup of coffee and start to date.

Due to his PTSD and anxiety disorder, Dane had to bury his dream of becoming a surgeon and is working as a physical therapist instead.

I felt the beginning was very promising, though it's unfortunate that the entire plot was impaired by a long-winded narrative. I wanted a 'tighter' story. Also, I thought the tale wasn't that compelling and somewhere along the way it simply lost its momentum. To be fair, I wasn't outright bored by it but it was too easy to put the book down. That never happened with Ben. I have such fond memories and simply devoured that ~~man~~ series. Here, however, I was actually glad for the story to be over. I know that does sound harsh but it's the truth. **Emotion is center-stage for me personally.** Reading a book means I live and breath emotion. If I don't feel "it" and if I don't really connect or care for the characters, then a novel sinks down to the vast sea of mediocrity.

I needed and wanted a boatload of groveling on the part of Dane. He didn't really have to work so hard to get Craig back.

But, gosh, there is so much to love about this book. And, one of those things is that this book puts Art at the forefront. We have an Artist & Doctor~ Anatomy of perception.....such a cleaver title. This book awesomely places emphases on the creative and beautiful mind of an autism babe. I love that so much that I find myself over looking any minor flaws and embracing the Beauty of the book, and in this book there is a lot of beauty. Inside and out.

One extra star for an exceptionally good story idea, but the execution was a complete failure.

I'm not going to repeat the blurb, but a broken person trying to put the pieces back together and try for a second chance? Awesome idea for a story. Awesome. Unfortunately we never really get to see that struggle. And the way the sequence of events are put together is more focused on Dane as the victim of a really shitty

past, rather than seeing Dane bottom out and then struggle to recover.

This is written with the chapters alternating between the present and the slow progression of Dane's past from 2005 up until the moment of crisis that drove him and Craig apart in 2012. The pacing is slaughtered by two things: the irritating, repetitious push-pull of constant flashbacks that reiterate and flesh out whatever Dane says or thinks about his past; and the attempted slow build of the initiating events that led to the crisis. Rose was attempting, I think, to have both story lines, the fracture and the redemption arcs, climax at the same point in the book, but all it does is make this very long book drag.

It was an ambitious plan, but the way it's written robs Dane's present of any power, makes it a bit distanced and superficial, because you don't get to see why he fell apart, that happens later in the book, or any part of his efforts to put himself back together. That two years is missing out of this book. The story starts, poof! with Dane trying to get Craig back after having done "something" unforgivable a couple of years ago. The details of that initiating crisis aren't revealed until very late in the story (although you've got a pretty clear idea of what happened before you're 20% in because the author has given lots of general outline). The breakdown and crisis should feed the redemption story. It doesn't make a whole lot of sense when one doesn't lead into the other, but instead runs parallel to it.

As a result of all the dropped hints, half told bits and foreshadowing, the story felt mostly done about the 50% mark, which leaves the last 50% as an exercise in fill in the blanks. I skimmed a lot of the last half of this one because I was bored. Honestly, I didn't care about Craig, or Dane or whether they got back together. They didn't feel real to me and the constant jumping around kept me from feeling any attachment to the story.

The other problem(s) that bring this down close to a one star are the flatness of the side characters and the superficial, easy tropes that weaken a great redemption, second chances arc. To the point where I wasn't engaged and didn't care about what happened between Dane and Craig.

The best friend (beard) Helen is the standard way too helpful supportive female. She is bookended by the gay collecting ambitious manipulative female coworker. I know I harp on this, but there is no reason not to have fleshed out, balanced female side characters rather than various versions of madonna and whore. I'm tired of it and I will consistently mark down books where I see it.

This book badly needed a good developmental editor, because the ideas of the story had enormous potential, but instead it felt gimmicky and clunky.
